

## New Map Reveals Glaciation Surface

A giant five-foot map, showing the first entire North American glaciation surface during the pleistocene age, was received this week by Dr. W. D. Smith, geology department head, from the National Research council in Washington, D. C.

It is the first complete map representation ever to be compiled in America. Dr. Smith and Dr. R. L.

Staples, contributed Oregon sources for the map.

"The map," said Dr. Smith, "is the outcome of a hundred years or more of preparation throughout America. It shows the first attempt at representing the glacial features of North America in considerable detail on a large scale."

Outstanding feature of the map shows the distinctive drift sheets of the pleistocene age and plots the directions of glacier flow in North America. Colors and symbols show the ice areas believed to have been covered by glaciation.

Colors denote older glaciation representing drift sheets. A wide pink color shows glaciation in Wisconsin and bed rock glaciation surface.

Present glacial areas in remote spots in the Arctic and in the Aleutian islands are also depicted.

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
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
