

Status of Students In China Discussed

Low En Wang, former student and instructor at the National Central university in Nanking, China, and now a student at Oregon State college, spoke to members of the One World club last Thursday on the status of students in China and the attitude of the Chinese toward the American forces in China.

Because China lived in isolation for so long, they became suspicious of any foreigners, he said.

Chinese Declared Peaceful

Part of the resentment of the Chinese toward American forces in China is due to their peaceful nature, since they dislike even the sight of their own troops on the streets in peacetime, Wang explained.

He said that the Chinese are grateful to the United States for the help they have given China and for the help that is forthcoming.

Now studying sugar beet technology at Oregon State college, Wang has been studying the cultivation of sugar cane at Louisiana State college.

Whole School Moved

While he was still a student at the National Central university in Nanking, the whole school was moved to Chungking.

He will be leaving for China by way of San Francisco within the next few weeks.

Wang was introduced in the One World club meeting by James Chan, special student from Vancouver, Alberta.

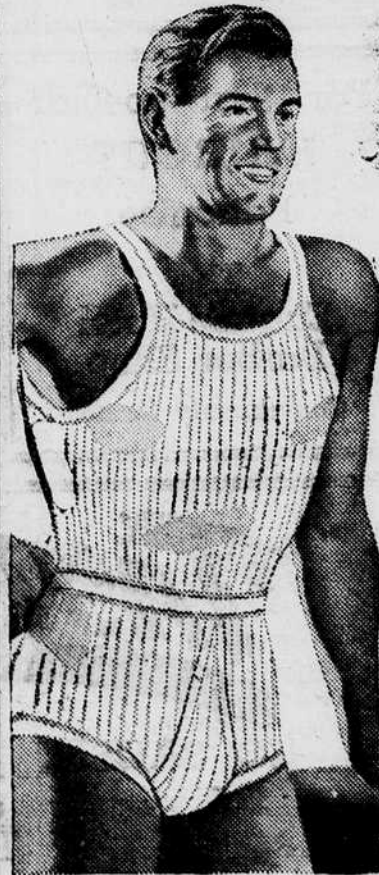
