

Ducks Level Huskies 64-54

Win Snags Loss Streak As Hobsonmen Hit Peak

The University of Oregon's Webfoot cagers rebounded from three consecutive conference defeats last night to out-run the invading Washington Huskies 64-54 in the second game of their McArthur court series. It was the fourth Oregon victory against six losses in northern division play and brought them to within one game of the third place Huskies. The two teams meet again in Seattle February 21 and 22.

The Northerners were ahead only three times in the entire ballgame as the lemon and green Ducks displayed their best form since early against the weary invaders, who were playing their fourth game in five nights.

Center Jack Nichols opened the scoring on a lay-in to put the Huskies 2-up and, following Ed Dick's tip-in, Sammy White drove in for the Hec Edmundson cagers to put them ahead 4-2.

The Ducks then went to work with Dick Wilkins and Dick leading the way. They mounted to a 17-12 advantage, and then the scoring leveled off.

Huskies Take Lead

A Husky drive late in the first half whittled down the lead, and at 16:00 they went ahead 25-24 as Bob Jorgensen hooked one in from the side. Nichols then connected on a free throw, and White canned a set shot from the side to put the Huskies four points in the lead.

Here the Ducks steadied as Center Roger Wiley dunked a rebound and a free throw, Williamson a length-of-the-floor dribble and lay-in, Wilkins a set from the key, and Dick a free throw. With a half minute to go Nichols dropped a free throw and the Webfoots led 32-29 at the half.

The Huskies pressed early in the second half as they drew to within one point of the lead on four occasions. An Oregon flurry

New Backfield Coach Named

Frank Zazula, backfield coach at Akron university (Ohio) in 1940-41, was added to Jim Aiken's Oregon football coaching staff, according to an announcement released late last night.

Zazula played prep football at McKinley high school (Canton, Ohio) under Aiken, where he was a teammate of Dick Miller, recently appointed line coach.

He was just recently discharged from the navy, is married, and has two young daughters.

Aiken stated that Zazula was the best backfield player he had coached in his 25 years as a football mentor. The appointment is subject to the approval of the State Board of Higher Education.

There will be a third coach named to the Oregon coaching staff, but the appointment will not be made until after spring practice in April.

In past contests with the Eaglesmen the junior Ducks have always managed to edge them out, but with increasing difficulty. Consequently, the game is not figured to be a walkaway for either squad.

Injuries have hampered the collegians in their last three contests, but they expect to be at nearly full strength tonight. Ken Seeborg will probably be back in the starting lineup at his guard spot after a week's respite because of a bad ankle. Jim Bocchi is also expected to start at the other guard position. He has been playing little lately because of an ailing shoulder.

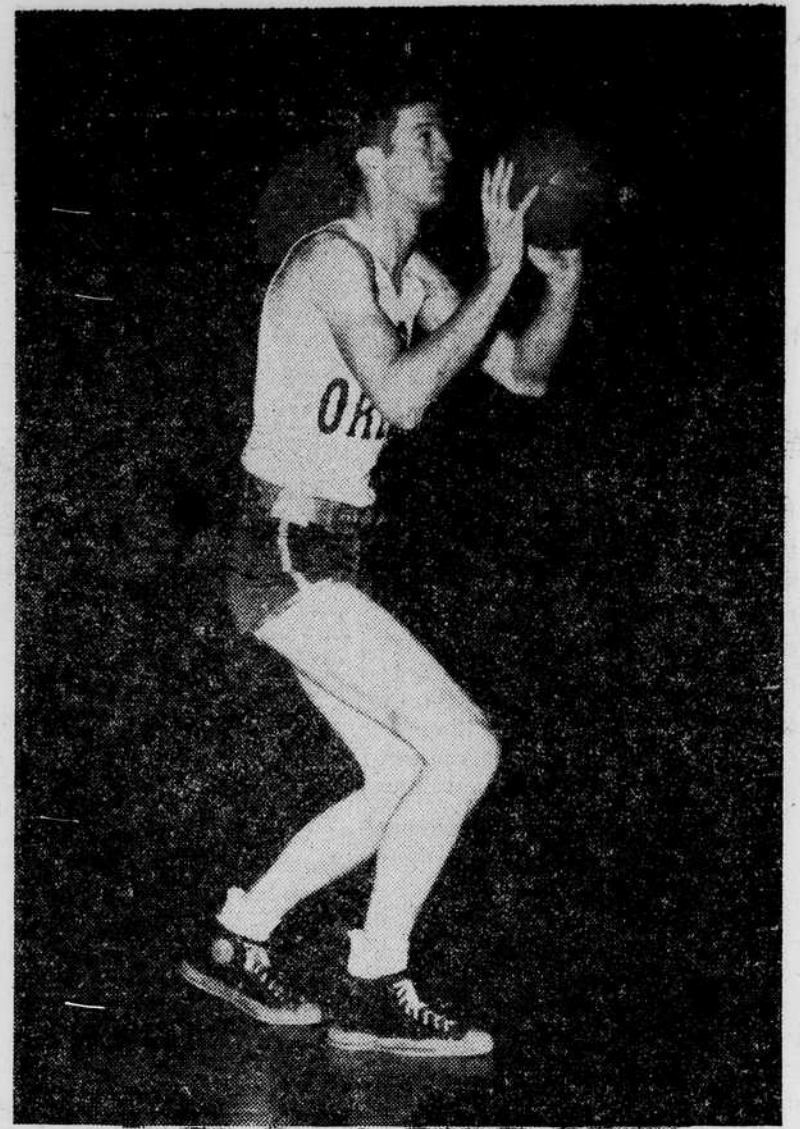
