

Three Killed As Streamliner Hits Gas Tank

FRESNO, Calif., Feb. 4.—(AP) The crack Southern Pacific train, San Joaquin Daylight, crashed into a gasoline tank truck-trailer at Kingsburg at 3:25 p.m. today and at least three persons were killed as flames swiftly engulfed the 14-car streamliner.

Estimates of the number of injured ranged from as low as 25 to as many as 100, the latter the figure of the Kingsburg chief of police. The injured were taken from Kingsburg, 20 miles south of Fresno, to hospitals at Selma, Fresno, Visalia and other communities in the area. Some were in the Kingsburg hospital.

Among the injured is A. C. Haag, 60, president of A. C. Haag & Co., tractor and machinery firm, Salem, Ore., injuries to both ankles.

All of the train except the last four cars, comprising a section of the Sacramento Daylight, were burned, the railroad said. Neither the locomotive nor any of the cars was derailed.

Mine Sunk Near Astoria

ASTORIA, Feb. 4.—(AP) A floating mine believed carried to the Oregon coast by ocean currents from Japan has been sunk off the mouth of the Columbia river by the coast guard cutter Onondaga.

Bill Would Boost State Officers Pay

SALEM, Feb. 4.—(AP) Bills to give state officials salary increases ranging from \$1,200 to \$4,500 a year were ready today for introduction in the legislature, probably by the house state and federal affairs committee.

Quick action on the raises for the 15 top state officers is expected, as the ways and means committee members want to know what salaries will be to enable them to draft the budget.

The governor would get the biggest increase, from \$7,500 a year to \$12,000.

Atlantic Coast Shivers Under New Cold Wave

Winds of gale velocity blew a cold wave eastward to the Atlantic seaboard Tuesday as much of the nation felt the sting of winter's sharpest blasts.

The frigid air mass, surging eastward at express train speed, sent temperatures into the fastest skid of the winter. Although lower readings have been recorded this winter, weather forecasters said the high winds made the current cold wave the most biting of the season.

Announcements Made Tuesday

ASUO President Tom Kay Tuesday appointed Hal Brevig, senior representative to the executive council, head of a committee, which will include Laura Olson and Don Pinkerton, sophomore representatives, to draw up a model constitution for the adoption of all organizing classes.

Roberts, reporting on the Freshman elections, said that Friday would be the last day for contesting the election. On that day the ballots will be burned.

The council also approved a recommendation that only authorized ballot counters be present at counting time.

Thirty dollars was appropriated from the ASUO miscellaneous fund on petition from Dad's Day Chairman Bob Wallace for promotion.

U.S. Blasts Poles On Election Issue

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP) President Truman today personally told the new Polish ambassador, Jozef Winiewicz, that the Polish government "has failed to fulfill" its pledge to hold free elections.

Mr. Truman, however, received the envoy and accepted his designation as ambassador "of the Republic of Poland." This apparently put an end to any remaining speculation that the United States might break diplomatic relations with the Polish government because of the way in which it conducted national elections on Jan. 19.
