

# Graduate's 'Blue Bone' Painting Featured in Art Gallery Display

Among the paintings now on display in the Little Art Gallery in the art school is an abstraction called "The Blue Bone," by Dorr Bothwell, a former University student.

Considered by many art critics to be one of the leading women painters in California, Miss Bothwell was at Oregon from 1921 to 1923 and studied under Miss Maude Kerns, in the art school. According to Miss Kerns, her former student had to leave school after the death of her father in 1923 and moved to San Diego where she taught for a while at the Museum School of Art.

### Studied Pacific Islanders

Still continuing with her painting, Miss Bothwell later traveled in some of the South Pacific islands to study the primitive arts there. After observing and studying about the native dances and rituals of the island tribes, the artist studied for some time in Paris. Miss Kerns added that during her studies in France Miss Bothwell earned expense money by giving interpretations of the native dances she had learned in the Pacific.

After returning to California, the painter was married to Donald Hord, a sculptor of that state. At present Miss Bothwell is teaching at the School of Fine Arts in San Francisco and has classes in design and color, and textiles.

### Paintings Displayed

Besides her teaching, Miss Bothwell continues her painting and exhibiting work. A recent "One-Man" display of her work was on exhibit last fall in the City of Paris art galleries in San Francisco. In addition to her abstract painting in water colors and oils, the artist is continuing her work in textile designs and prints.

Her former instructor, Miss Kerns and she have corresponded

since Miss Bothwell left Oregon and last summer on a visit to California, the University art professor paid a visit to the well-known artist at her school in San Francisco.

## Chem Department Gets Refrigerator

## Russian Fellowship Offered Students

The American Russian institute invites student applications for its fellowship for advanced study in the field pertaining to the Soviet Union. The fellowship is for \$1,500, to be used in the academic year 1947-48.

Applications for the award must be submitted not later than February 15. The announcement of the appointment to the fellowship will be made on or about April 15.

No restrictions as to age will be imposed by the award committee. Candidates who already have a record of constructive study in the fields they nominate will be favored.

The fellowship may be used in any approved institution in the United States, or in the Soviet Union if study in the latter country is possible during the period of the fellowship.

## Science Honorary Sets Talk by Dr. Sturtevant

Under the auspices of the University of Oregon chapter of Sigma Xi, science honorary, and the University lecture committee, Dr. A. H. Sturtevant, professor of genetics at the California Institute of Technology, will lecture on "The Evolution and Function of Genes" at Chapman hall on Friday, February 7.

One of the world's foremost authorities on genetics, Dr. Sturtevant will present a general picture of the evening primrose which served as the basic organism in the development of the mutation theory of evolution. Dr. Sturtevant was co-author of a standard textbook on how genes and gene systems develop and operate in the body.

The lecture will be held in room 207, Chapman hall at 8:00 p.m. following a business meeting in room 204 at 7:30 p.m.

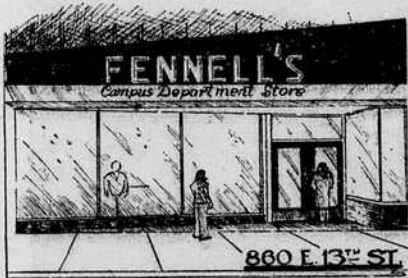
