## **Reporting Classes** Hear Farm Editor

J. S. Russell, for 21 years farm editor of the Des Moines Register-Tribune, spoke to members of Dean George Turnbull's and Warren C. Price's reporting classes Monday.

Russell said that he disliked the prevalent practices of calling a press conference, handing out news releases, or granting interviews when a news source has some news. "News is where you find it, and it belongs to the fellow who digs it up," Russell said.

He explained that no matter what specialized field in which a jourralist is planning to enter, he needs a good background in the fundamentals contained in reporting. He particularly emphasized the need for accuracy.

Work on a weekly newspaper gives a good background since workers on a small paper gain experience in many fields, Russell said.
