The Sperry division of the General Mills Flour company is sending a representative to interview candidates for sales positions, Dean Onthank said.

A well-paying job with the American Gas Accumulator company is available this summer, Dean Onthank announced. The company is looking for a man with business experience to manage the northwest division of the company's sales of airport ground lighting equipment. A college degree and a pilot's license are prerequisites for the job. A commission as an officer with the army or navy may be substituted for business experience, Dean Onthank said.




