
DUCK TRACKS

One of the best-remembered baseball teams that Howard Hobson ever coached at Oregon is the 1937 Northern Division championship squad. As Hobby remembers them— and he

remembers all of his ball players—they were quite a gang. Though they won the conference title that year, they didn't get really excited about anything but umpires. And Hobson says that they needed very little in the way of an excuse to make things tough for an ampire.

Typical of the teams actions with league officials was in a Washington series at Seattle. It seems that the man in black made what the Ducks considered a bad decision and the team arrived en masse, encircled the umpire and began to give him its opinion of his abilities as an ump. The official, one George Klink, took a dim view of the spirit shown

by the Webfoot athletes and ordered three of them to take leave of the ball park.

Hobby Used Diplomacy

At this point Hobson arrived on the scene protesting the decision also, but when he found what drastic action the umpire had taken he changed his factics immediately—told the ball players to leave the man alone and go back to their positions. Then in a diplomatic manner he explained to the seething Klink that boys will be boys. The upshot of it all being that he forgot his original decision to toss the complaining lads out, and let them finish the ball game.

Familiar names on that Webfoot squad were numerous. Bill Sayles and Bob Hardy were doing most of the pitching, Chief McClean was taking care of chores behind the bat, Jim Nicholson, Ralph Amato, and Andy Hurney were in the outfield, Ford Mullen was at third, Gal Smith was at first, and Jack Gordon was at short.

The following year a few new names were added to the Duck roster, and though it was potentially a great ball club they ended up in third place in division standings. Their only fault was that they failed to hustle. In 1399 Hobby had another hot one that did go all of the way, and it was a fine outfit. The lineup read like this: Elmer Mallory shortstop, Ford Mullen second base, Gale Smith first base, Wimpy Quinn third base, Jim Nicholson center field, Cece Walden catcher, Bill "Whizzer" White left field and Jack Shimshak in right field. Top pitcher that year was Bob Hardy.

Wimpy Quinn Seriously III

Hobby was reminded of the exploits of the '38 and '39 ball clubs just a few days ago when he received word that Wimpy Quinn, who is one of the better-known Webfoot greats, is very seriously ill in Los Angeles. Quinn's ailment has been diagnosed as cancer of the lung and his chances of recovery are not considered good. Hobby has written to him and suggests that should anyone else care to do the same the letter should be addressed to Don Stewart, president of the Los Angeles baseball tam.

Wimpy made a great start in baseball and still had a prinising career ahead of him. After leaving Oregon he went to Tacoma of the Western International league, from there to Los Angeles in the Coast league and then to the Chicago Cubs. During the war he served in the marine corps and was starring for a team in Oahu. After his discharge he returned to Los Angeles.

Williamson Mentioned . . . But Not Officially

Though the Oregon State Barometer and the Portland Oregonian have carried bits about Oregon State's Lew Beck and Oregon's Stan Williamson both running for student body president at their respective schools, it's only a half truth. The "Salmon's" name has been mentioned frequently in connection with nominations—but he has yet to actually run. Incidentally Beck and his party were soundly thumped in elections at the State college.

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
