reserve are reminded that they will not obtain added credit toward G. I. schooling by reason of being recalled to active duty for 15-day training periods, according to a decision of VA policy officials in Washington.

Furthermore, the VA holds that these training periods do not constitute active duty for purposes of entitlement to increased educational benefits under the G.I. Bill, nor may such periods be counted toward establishment of the qualifying period for educational benefits.

This ruling, however, would not apply if the call to duty were for an indefinite period and the veteran served 30 days or more.

In general, an eligible veteran of World War II is entitled to one year's training or schooling at government expense, plus an additional month's training for every month of active duty up to a maximum of four years.

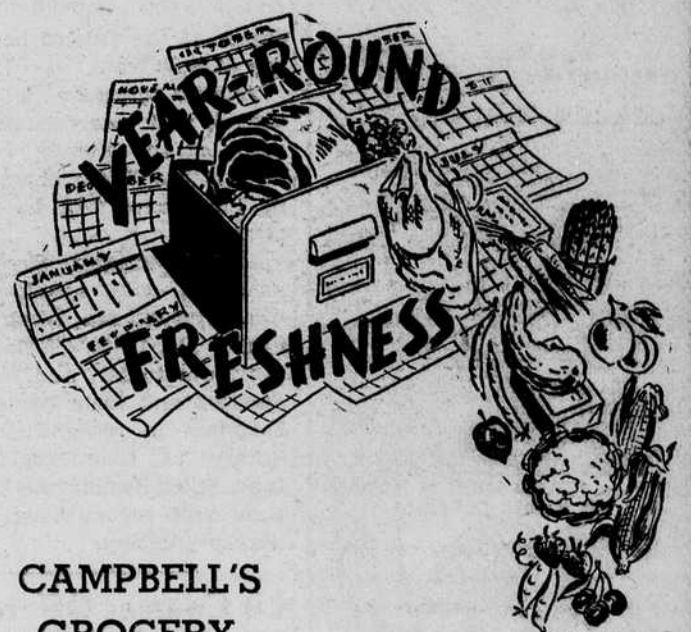
