

# Officers to Hear WD Top Man Speak Friday

Former commissioned officers who will receive degrees in June and are interested in applying for a regular army commission will be addressed Friday, May 16, by a representative of the war department, Colonel J. E. McCammen, PMS&T of the University ROTC, announced yesterday.

The meeting will be held in room 3, Fenton hall at 3 p.m. Among the issues discussed will be the opportunities now available for a commission, the current ROTC program and the opportunities that will be available to future graduates.

Following the first representative, a war department screening

board will arrive to process the applications of all individuals in the Eugene area who are currently qualified for appointment. This board will convene in ROTC headquarters on May 26, 27 and 28.

### 147 Graduates Eligible

Advance information states that all former commissioned officers who will graduate by July 15, 1947 are immediately eligible to apply.

Appointments will be made in the air corps, judge advocate general's department, medical corps, dental corps, veterinary corps and chaplains corps to those specially qualified.

Those who will not be over 28 years of age by July 15, 1947 and were commissioned in the AUS or any of its components subsequent to July 15, 1944 may apply for appointments in the coast artillery, cavalry, field artillery, infantry, corps of engineers, finance department, ordnance department, quartermaster corps, transportation corps, signal corps, chemical corps, and corps of military police.

Previous announcements stated that applications would be received until April 15, however, the latest information indicates that applications will be accepted until the screening board arrives.

Anyone desiring additional information should contact the University ROTC headquarters.

### County Goal Set

(Continued from page two) be maintained—for not more than five years.

The word "trusteeship" hurt the ears of Koreans—under the Jap whip for half a century. The large majority of them objected—asked for immediate freedom and independence. Russia stepped in, said the decision had been made by "democratic" countries at Moscow and that those Korean political parties in the Russian zone who objected must not be democratic and consequently could not participate in discussions leading to the founding of a provisional government. Since the Korean communist party was the only one to favor the Moscow plan, this amounted to the negating the voice of all other political groups. The United States would not accept this position, causing the stalemate that lasted a year.

In the meantime U.S.A.F.I.K. established a Korean Interim Legislative assembly "in order to prepare south Koreans for democratic self-government."

### Financial Aid and Industrial Provisions

Commanding General John R. Hodge was in the United States recently. He did not veil his purpose—that of securing financial aid and industrial provisions for southern Korea. The New York Times remarked on April 11, "All Koreans

expect a gigantic pouring in of supplies from the United States. Many believe that in the face of the contemplated assistance from the United States the Soviet forces in north Korea will be unable to withstand the pressure with propaganda alone." Undoubtedly this is why the Soviet Union has made its new proposal.

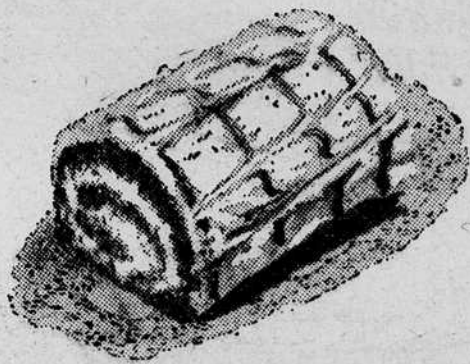
