Agency to Provide Advertising Tests

Ten senior students have registered for the American Association of Advertising agencies examination to be given in Portland, June 7. Any others interested are urged to submit their application immediately. R. D. Millican, assistant professor of business administration and journalism, announced.

The examination will test the applicant's aptitude for the basic types of advertising. The results of the test will be compiled, interpreted, and sent to the applicant.

If the results are favorable and the person is available for employment, his name will be submitted to the 4A advertising agencies in this area as a potential employee.

Part one of the two-part test, requiring eight hours, will be given at Multnomah college Saturday, June 7. The second part of the test may be completed by the participants during the following week and submitted by mail.

Any students interested in employment in the advertising agency field may apply to take the test, although the number of applications accepted is limited. The fee for the examination is \$15, payable upon completion of the first part of the test.
