GARNISH WITH YARBS

THE KEG AND I—(777 pp.)—Fred Flotsam and Jerry Jetsam—Smut of the Month (\$3.50).

No carping critics we, but this thirst-provoking magnum opus by Grizzled Gruff Fred-Flotsam and Pear Shaped Jerry Jetsam blitzes through 21 chapters of hard-as-nails cider—and gets there.

No backwater writers they, but thoroughly ripened craftsmen, Flotsam and Jetsam have hammered out a boilermaker that is to-be-reckoned with force of its type (8'pt.).

The plot brews in Olympia in the heart of the vast Rainier mining country and delves into the book bottoms of human frailties, foibles, and lurking evils. At times it is powerful, at other times weak flaccid, acid, and rancid.
