The old system of co-op receipts, turned in for year-end rebate, will be abandoned next year, according to M. F. McCiam, manager of the Co-op store.

In the past all students were members of the co-op, and received rebates on cash register receipts turned in at the end of the year.

Under the new system the student will be charged a \$1 membership fee, and will be given a number which he must remember. After each purchase the clerk will write the student's membership
