Mrs. Turnipseed also reminded students who plan moving into University dorms from private homes that they must first secure a written release from the householder, or a substitute for the rooms.

Reason for the new regulation, according to the director, is that "many people in Eugene have generously opened their doors to meet the housing need, going to much expense and sacrifice to provide housing. It is only fair and courteous that these students show their appreciation by remaining throughout the term," she said.
