

Kappas, Pi Phis Deadlocked by 0-0 Tie

Kappa Defense Spikes Pi Phi Grid Monster

The season's most unusual gridiron encounter wound up in a 0-0 deadlock Sunday as a well-polished Pi Phi offensive was bottled by a seven-man Kappa football crew that effectively turned the key in the lock everytime the Pi Phi scoring arrow seemed destined to puncture the goal line.

Sparked by forceful drives of scatback Jackie Newburn, the Pi Phi aggregation of pledges succeeded in chalking up a lead in first downs, but their attempts to score were blocked by the determined defense of the undermanned Kappa pledge team.

The brilliant ineffectiveness of the poorly executed plays provided unprecedented thrills for the throngs of spectators that crowded the sidelines.

Play Abandoned

The Pi Phis several times attempted a sleeper play, but were forced to abandon it when Referee Don McCollom stopped the game because he could see only six Pi Phi players on the field.

Both teams were more adept at batting down passes than making them, and any semblance of an aerial attack bogged down as the pigskin slithered off polished nails.

Despite the desperate determination of both teams, a spirit of splendid sportsmanship prevailed. According to veteran Field Judge Al Crosbie, "It was the cleanest game it has ever been my pleasure to officiate."

"The Kappas played a good game. It was fun playing against them. Hope it can be done again some day," said Joan Carr, Pi Phi captain, as she limped off Gerlinger Bowl field after the tilt.

Kappa captain, Pat Robbins, commented, "Now back to ping pong—but don't think it hasn't been fun. Thanks to the Pi Phis for being such grand sports."

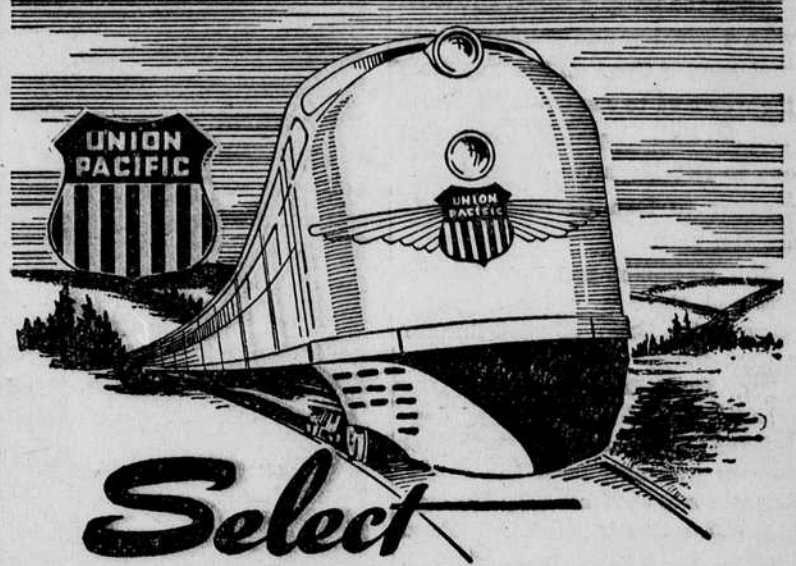
