

Stanton to Captain Gridders Saturday

Right tackle Don Stanton, 218 pound junior first-stringer, was named by Coach Jim Aiken to captain the Webfoot grid club Saturday against the University of Washington in the Mutnoh stadium battle.

Stanton has been one of the "iron men" in the Oregon line playing nearly 50 minutes of every ball game this season. As one of the strongest members of the Duck forward wall last season he was second only to Bob Koch in the number of minutes played.

Oregon is going to depend heavily upon power plays for yardage against the Huskies, it appears, as the weather man promises little hope for a letup in the rain this weekend, and, therefore, little hope for a passing attack. Two sets of ball-carriers have been groomed for the past week in practice for action against the Seattle crew.

Johnson Ready

Besides the probable starting backfield of Jim Newquist and Jake Leicht at the half spots and Bob Koch at fullback, a heavier and nearly as fast set of backs is ready to go. DeWayne Johnson, who has mostly seen action on defensive operations this season, is expected to be at right half a good share of the time Saturday.

George Bell, who played a rugged brand of ball defensively against UCLA last week, is slated to do some ball-carrying from the left half position. Booming Bob Sanders, the pile-driving fullback from North Bend who smashed across the only Oregon touchdown Saturday is the third member of this power unit. The trio is expected to see considerable action individually, as well as a ground-attack unit.

The Webfoot mudders went through another sloppy practice Thursday as they worked over the passing and ground plays that are to be used against the Huskies.

A light tapering-off drill is scheduled for today, as the team is not going to Portland until tomorrow morning. The 37-man squad, leaving by train at 8:25 a.m., will arrive at Portland at 11:30. From the train station a bus will take the squad directly to the stadium. A light loosening-up drill will be held before the game.

Pass Defense Tight

The gold dust combination of Norm Van Brocklin and Dan Garza is expected to have a rough time against the Huskies. Van Brocklin has been having some trouble with his aerials because of the pigskin's slippery condition, and he will have to toss against the best pass defense on the coast. Washington has allowed fewer pass completions than any other team in the conference this season.

Art Miller, a sticky-fingered reserve end, will not be able to make the Portland jaunt as expected. The slender receiver is back in the infirmary, after a short release after a flu attack.

Warren Calls First Practice For Monday

Top physical condition will be the slogan Monday when the first turnout of varsity basketball hopefuls takes place. John Warren, newly appointed head mentor, has warned all potential hoopsters that in order to survive the tough competition for a team berth they will have to be able to run, and this calls for first-rate condition.

Warren has already announced his intention to stick with the fast-break style used by former Coach Howard Hobson. The Ducks have long been known as one of the fastest moving teams in the country, and are always big drawing cards on their eastern pre-season invasion because of the wide-open brand of ball played.

The Webfoot courtmen will again make the eastern tour this fall, as they have in the past, although the exact schedule isn't set yet. In the past the Oregon team has usually made two appearances in Madison Square Garden in New York City.

Competition for a place on the varsity squad will be tough this fall. At least six lettermen are expected to turn out Monday, along with a number of sharpsters up from the frosh and junior varsity squads.

If more players report for practice than can be handled on the varsity squad a junior varsity team will be formed. It will be coached by Don Kirsch, newly appointed assistant hoop mentor and head baseball coach.

Both last year's frosh and junior varsity maple quints had regular playing schedules, and racked up enviable records. The freshmen hung up 22 straight victories before they were knocked off, and the Jayvees dropped only six games in their 30-game season.

Injuries Many

In the backfield, rifle-armed Earl Steele will take the hand-off from center in the T-formation quarterback spot. At left half will be Hawaiian-born Bobby Moore, and Dennis Sullivan will be stationed at right. Big Jim Hanns, former Eugene Hi line-buster, will round out the potent backfield at the tail-back post.

As a muddy contest seems likely, Welch will probably have a starting backfield that averages 193 pounds. This would put Dick Ottele at quarterback, Larry Hatch and Sam Robinson at the halves, and Marshall Dallas at the fullback slot.

The Husky forward wall is expected to average 203 pounds per man. Gail Bruce and Al Kean are likely to start at the wing posts. Arnie Weinmeister and John Prechek will be at tackles, and Dmitri Tadich and Alf Hemstad at guards. Gordy Berlin is the probable center.
