"Develop your voice and put as much into it as possible," Helen Traubel, Wagnerian soprano, advised vocal students in an interview yesterday. "Too many students wait for the teacher to pour the qualities needed for a singing

career into them along with their lessons."

Miss Traubel remarked that it was through her mother's wisdom that she hesitated before entering the professional field, but that her mother did leave the final decision as to whether she was ready to herself.

In reply to a question of why she turned to Wagnerian works, Miss Traubel replied, "My voice reached maturity, and I developed the stamina and energy to sing this type. It is not that I necessarily prefer Wagner, but just that I am completely fitted in this field."

Having no real home possible during her concert seasons, which run from 10 to 11 months, Miss Traubel vacations at Laguna Beach. At present she is touring with the San Francisco Opera company and will go to the Golden Gate city next.

"If I ever stop singing, I should like to teach voice," the Wagnerian soprano commented. "No, I wouldn't be partial to boys or girls, but a boy usually likes a man for an instructor."

Miss Traubel explained that a singer never stops practicing. She always sings in her room before a performance, she remarked.
