

Swedish Line To Offer Six Student Trips

Six free trips to the Scandinavian countries in the summer of 1948 with all expenses paid are offered by the Swedish American line. G. H. Lundbeck, Jr., managing director of the line announced this week.

The trips will be first and second prizes for the best essays on "The Influence of Swedish Settlers on a Community or Region" in a contest to commemorate Swedish pioneer centennial.

Other awards include three trips to Swedish pioneer centennial celebrations planned in the Midwest next summer, and nine U. S. savings bonds.

The contest is open to three groups, judged separately:

1. College undergraduates;
2. High school and preparatory school students; and
3. Adults regardless of occupation.

The contest closes April 1, 1948. Fourteen prominent educators and heads of colleges will serve as judges.

The essays, written in English, may concern a person—man or woman of Swedish birth or descent—anywhere in the United States or Canada. The subject need not be a person of national prominence or of historical importance, but it must be someone who has exerted an influence on a community or region.

Lundbeck said that the essays may also concern a colony, group, society, church, or organization, past or present. He hopes "it will bring to light many interesting stories of Swedish immigration and the influence of Swedish settlers on American culture."
