

Med Students May Register For Scholarship

Students may now apply for the Jackson Johnson regional scholarships in medicine offered by Washington university, St. Louis, Missouri, it was announced yesterday by A. H. Kunz, head of the University of Oregon chemistry department. These scholarships are awarded annually to students from each of the seven regions of the United States, including the Pacific islands, Alaska, Panama canal zone, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin islands.

The scholarships are open to those who plan to enter the freshman class at Washington University school of medicine or transfers from a two-year medical school to the third year class at Washington university. The candidate must have resided for three years before application in one of the specified regions, and have completed pre-medical work, or the first two years of medicine in the same region.

Competition is between all students, whatever the financial need, the stipends varying with the financial resources of the students. The awards will be made by the committee on admissions and scholarships on the basis of the academic record in college or medical school, scores in aptitude tests, extracurricular activities, and recommendations.

All applications for a Jackson regional scholarship must be completed by March 1 for the classes beginning the following September. Further information may be secured from the registrar, Washington University school of medicine, Scott and Euclid avenues, St. Louis 10, Missouri.

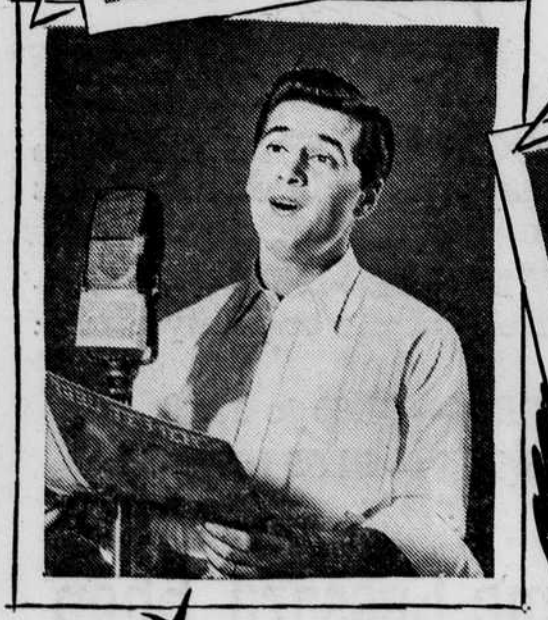
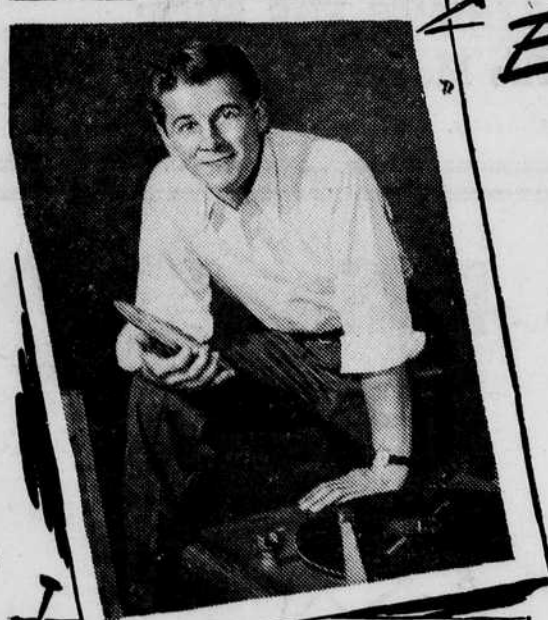
