The reports show that 1271 enrollments have been completed for the 68 evening courses offered this fall at 28 class centers. Fifty of those enrolling are veterans.

Leading the list of enrollments at the state-wide centers are Eugene, with 315 students, Klamath Falls with 150, and Salem with 100. The extension division emphasized that complete reports are not all in at this date, and that the final figures will rise considerably above the 1300 mark.

# The Fruits of Tahiti's Trees Will Go to Professors' Wages'

BANGOR, Me .- (UP) A professor who quit his job and exiled himself in the island of Tahiti 25 years ago has be queathed about \$800,000 to Harvard university. He thought "larger salaries should be paid to instructors."

The bequest was made in the will of Harrison W. Smith who resigned from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to grow tropical trees in the South Pacific.

He died there last January, but his will was filed here for probate where he had maintained his legal residence.

An inventory set the value of his estate at \$824,034. The bulk of this amount was left to Harvard.

#### Current Trend

Also to be examined are the causes of the trend toward the B.S. degree and away from the B.A., he said. Johnson further declared that possibly there was a need to stem the tide by restricting the student's easy choice or modifying the notion that knowledge of a foreign language is the indispensable and distinguishing mark of an arts degree.

Members of the committee appointed by Dr. Johnson are: David M. Dougherty, head of the foreign language department; Robert D. Clark, associate professor of speech; Andrew F. Moursund, head of the mathematics department; Ralph R. Huestis, professor of zoology; Will V. Norris, professor of physics; Luther S. Cressman, head of the anthropology department; Joel V. Berreman, associate professor of sociology; Gordon Wright, associate professor of history; and Hoyt Trowbridge, professor of English. Dr. Johnson will serve as ex-officio member.

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
