## WORLD HEADLINES

MILAN, Italy, Nov. 12—Communist mobs, surging through the streets of Italy's second largest city in thousands, wrecked a monarchist newspaper plant and the headquarters of the right wing common man party today. They were driven back in attacks on the newspaper organ of the Catholic church and on a police station.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12—Michael Kosar, 45, "stool pigeon," member of a safe-cracking gang charged with a \$2,000,000 robbery two years ago, was shot and killed tonight as he sat at dinner with his family at his home. Kosar was sitting in the kitchen of his second-floor apartment with his wife and son when a shotgun blast tore through a window. He died shortly afterward at St. Anne's hospital.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12. A jury of six men and six women was selected in federal court today to hear charges against former army colonel William K. Evans, 36, accused of stealing \$100,000 in Japanese gold on the island of Formosa. One prospective juror, an ex-serviceman, was excused when he indicated he might be prejudiced against Evans because of his former military rank. But the panel included three former soldiers who said they would give Evans a fair trial.

TRIESTE, Nov. 12. United States army authorities announced tonight that Sergeant Duell Farrell, 21, Starkville, Miss., who was seized by Yugoslav troops yesterday while fishing southeast of Gorizia, was turned over to Italian officials in Gorizia late today. Farrell returned to his unit and reported that he had been treated well by the Yugoslavs. He said he was questioned briefly and then held under guard at San Pietro, a small Yugoslav town.

Washington, Nov. 12. The civil aeronautics board said today that hearings on the private plane crash in which Gov. Earl Snell of Oregon and three others died on October 28 will begin tomorrow at 9 a.m. PST, in Klamath Falls, Ore. (Veterans Memorial hall.) Russel A. Potter of the board's safety bureau will preside at the inquiry. In addition to Snell, the crash claimed the lives of Secretary of State Robert Farrell, Jr., and Senate President Marshall E. Cornett.

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## Dr. R. H. Edwin Espy Outlines Duties of Christian Associations

Major duties of student Christian associations were outlined to a joint Y cabinet meeting Wednesday by Dr. R.H. Edwin Espy, national executive secretary of the student YMCA.

"A student Y must make itself sensitive to all areas of need in campus life," according to Dr. Espy. He continued, "It must also outreach to the rest of the world, and make a balanced program of worship, study, and action."

### Duties Help Vets

Espy explained that these duties must be performed to answer the new moods and thinking of veteran students.

"All thinking students of today are concerned with the deeper things in life even though they do not always admit them religiously," Espy said. "They are asking themselves if there is a

pattern of life in the world ruled by one God."

Espy stated that the YMCA and YWCA wish to help them into this faith of Christian understanding and commitment. He also remarked that this faith must necessarily be one related to life.

### 'Y' Aids Students

"The statement of purpose of the Y helps the student in his search for a faith and meeting on an interdenominational basis," Espy said.

He added that the Y fulfills the student desire for fellowship, identification, and belonging. It is the belief of Espy that all students are basically lonely. He added that the Y includes all races in its membership.

### Anniversary Celebrated

Espy visited the University campus to speak in celebration of the 75th anniversary of student Christian organizations. He met with the YMCA cabinet and advisory board at a dinner meeting.

At an open meeting in Gerlinger hall Wednesday night Espy installed Jack Merner as executive director of the University YMCA.

## Bureau Announces Bulletin on Trees

The bureau of municipal research and service at the University has announced the publication of a bulletin entitled "Street Trees for Cities."

This bulletin is a 16-page pamphlet dealing with the planting and control of trees along city streets. On the cover is a picture of the trees lining the parkings along 13 Street, looking east from Johnson hall.

The bulletin was prepared to encourage the development of community projects in the cities of Oregon and the nation. Copies will be sent to city officials throughout the state, and later to cities in other states.

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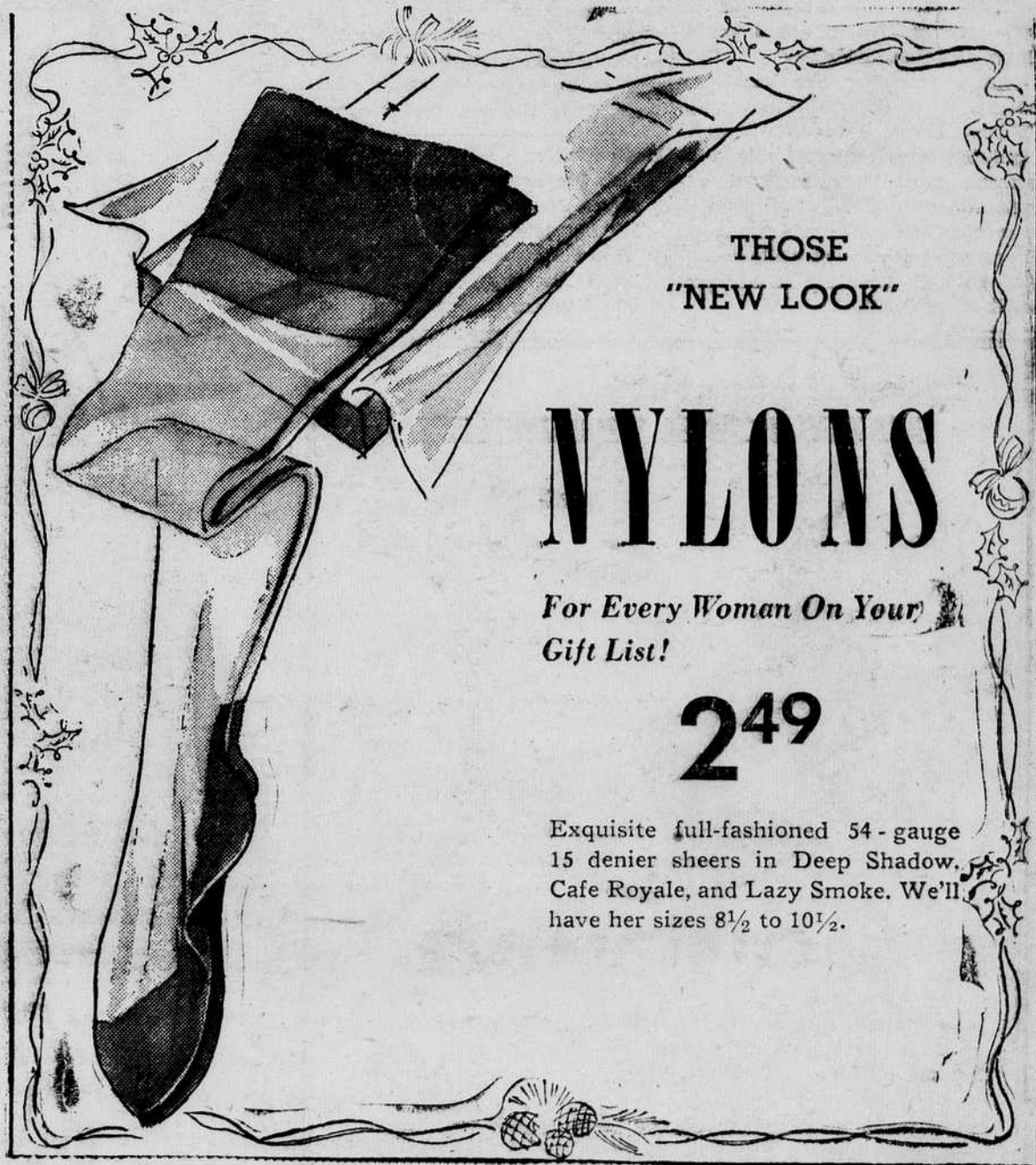
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
