
Dribble Demons

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., Dec. 2—(UP)—Champion Joe Lewis disclosed his supreme confidence of retaining his heavyweight title Head Mentor against Jersey Joe Walcott Friday night by signing contracts today for \$80,000 worth of "champion's appearances" in London.

Should Louis lose his heavyweight crown, the London appearances automatically will be cancelled.

The London venture-which will prevent another Louis fight at -was announced just before Louis land. hammered through four fast rounds with three sparmates before more than 300 spectators.


