

Athletic Office Renews Rules Used Fall Term

Activity Books Set For Athletic Events; Gate Hours Named

Athletic department officials announced Tuesday the renewal of admission regulations for students at the conference basketball games this term. The system was inaugurated last winter term and was found to be the most successful method of utilizing the full extent of the seating capacity.

The student gates will again open at 6 p.m. and will close promptly at 7:30 p.m. After this time no student will be admitted to the games on student athletic tickets.

All students have been urged to make application for their student athletic books at the athletic ticket office in McArthur court. Presentation of the blue winter term registration card is all that is necessary to pick up the book. The office will be open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Students are warned that the books will not be available after February 13. No student will be admitted to the winter term athletic events without the presentation of the student athletic book.

5063 Enrolled In Winter Term

Registrants for 1948 winter term at the University totaled 5,063 at the close of the first day of classes, Curtis E. Avery, registrar, announced Tuesday. The number, which was said to be incomplete by several hundred students, is 842 less than the 5,905 enrollees for fall term.

The apparent trend indicates that the percentage of decreased enrollments for this term will be below that of the average year, Avery said. About two and one-half per cent less, or 4,941, were enrolled at the end of the first day of winter term last year.
