MONTEREY, Calif.—Tony, a heart-broken collie dog who wouldn't eat while his soldier master was gone, was re-united today with Corp. Robert H. Stratman. But the army wonders if it was worth it.

The three-year-old tail wagger was flown here from Santa Monica, Calif., in a special air force "mercy plane." A group of army officers, who went to considerable trouble to save the grieving pet's life, made a proud and admiring audience for the grand reunion at the Ford Ordnance kennels.

JERUSALEM, Palestine.—Twenty bandits robbed Barclay's bank in Tel Aviv of more than \$37,000 today and British reinforcements were rushed to the Palestine-Syrian border where new fighting broke out between Arabs and Jews.

The border fighting, described as skirmishes, was around the settlements of Dan and Kefar Szold, which 800 Arab invaders attacked last Friday. There was no indication whether the Arabs today had filtered across the border.

ANNAPOLIS, Md.—The naval academy, weary of seeing its football team kicked around, scrapped its graduate coach system today and announced cryptically that it was going into the open market to obtain a civilian coach with an outstanding reputation.

Under the arrangement, Capt. Tom Hamilton, the navy coach will become director of athletics and will be among those who will decide on his successor.

PORTLAND, Ore.—D. L. Marlett, acting Bonneville administrator, said today that the \$38,475,000 requested by President Truman in his budget message to congress was the "minimum" necessary to take care of present electric service in the Bonneville and Grand Coulee dam areas.

The amount, he added, will not solve the basic shortage of power supply for industry and other development which can only be alleviated by completion of new dams under construction or authorized.

WASHINGTON—Sen. Wayne Morse, R., Ore., today introduced a bill authorizing a navy expenditure of up to \$1,600,000 on a water supply system at Astoria, Ore. The measure also would provide service for naval installations at Tongue point.

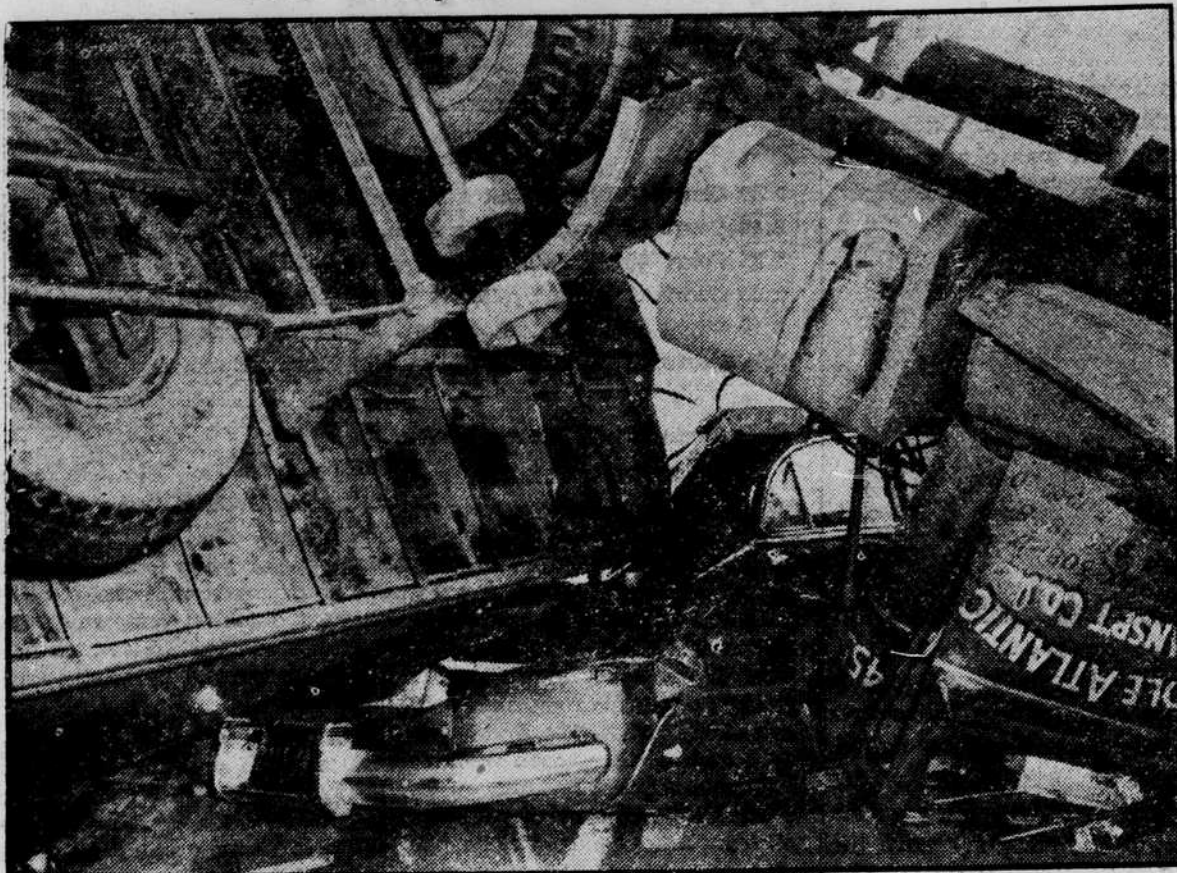
SAN FRANCISCO—Steak at \$1 a pound—and up—was predicted by AFL butchers' president, Milton Maxwell.

shortage predictions would "scare the people" into a depression.

He told the senate banking committee, which went to work on a wide range of GOP and Democratic plans to combat high prices, that the country would feel the meat shortage in March, April and May, and that congress "ought to

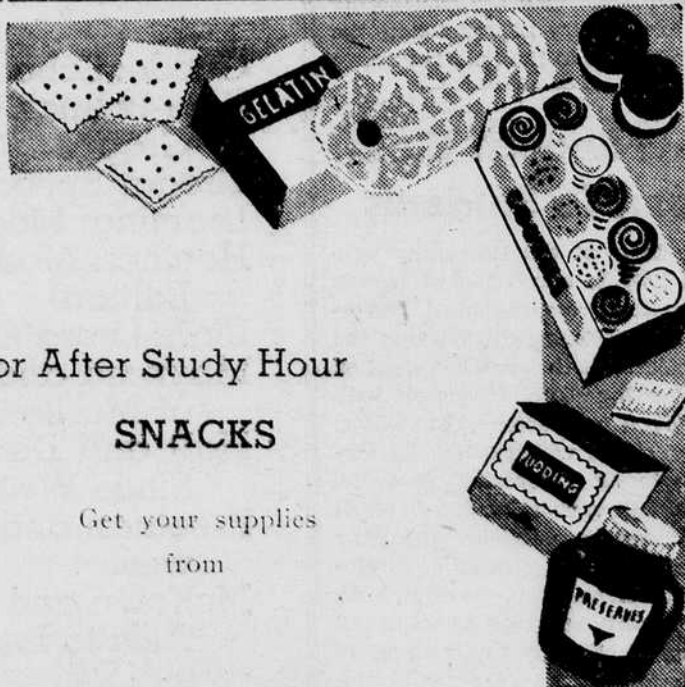
