DAVOS, Switzerland - Ex-King Michael of Romania and his Danish princess confirmed rumors that they are in love when they went into a movie-style clinch today on a railroad station platform in their first reunion since he abdicated his throne.

Before leaving the station, Maj. Jacques Vergotti, one of Michael's aides, told the United Press that there will be no official announcement of the couple's engagement, because they have been engaged Slate 6 Games ince December 6.

WASHINGTON - Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's "definite and positive" decision to take himself out of presidential politics split his supporters into three camps today.

Some said the "Ike for president boom" will go on anyway. Some took prompt steps to abandon it. Others frankly said they didn't know which way to turn.

WASHINGTON -Under sharp cross-examination by Edwin W. Pauley and Democratic senators, Harold E. Stassen tonight stuck by his charge that Pauley and 10 other persons made nearly \$5,000, 000 profit on commodity speculation "on the basis of inside information" about government export plans.

WASHINGTON - The CIO po litical action committee tonight voted 7-2 to throw "all of its resources" against a third party movement.

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
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
