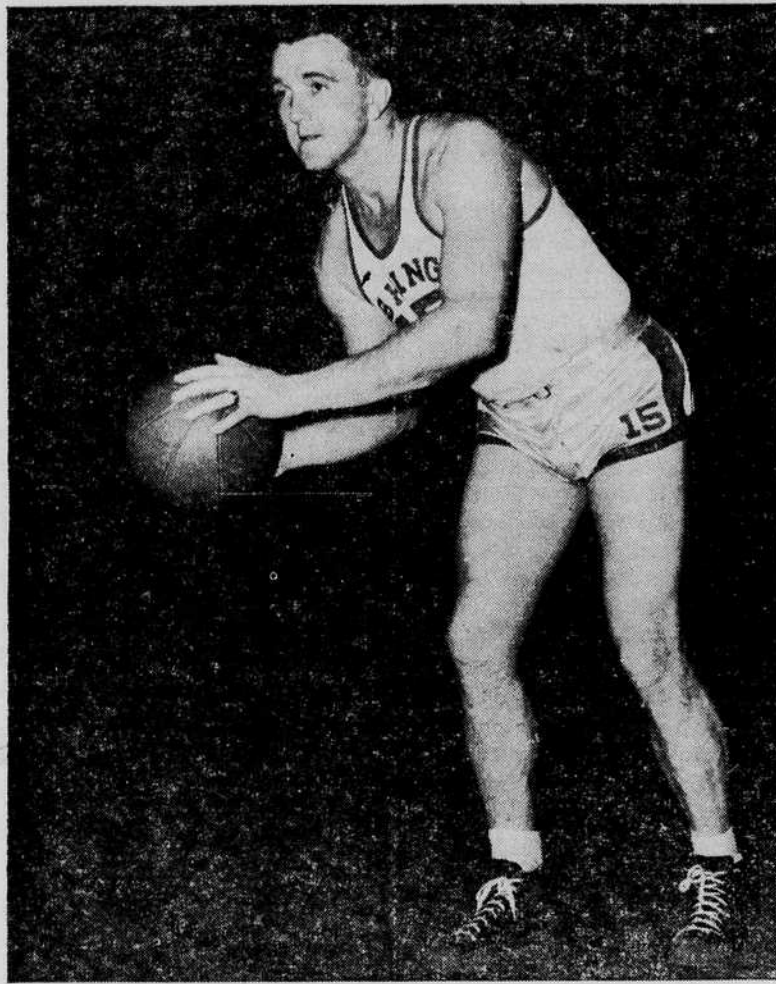
Coach Ray Kireilis has an experienced squad ready to perform today, with several records almost certain to be shattered in the four-man relay and the medley relay.

Wiley Sinks 24 Points But Vince Wins Game

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 3-(UP) Washington State's ace pivotman, 6 foot-8-inch Vince Hanson, blazed the way to victory tonight as the Cougars nipped the University of Oregon basketball squad 66 to 65 in a sizzling overtime before 5800 hysterical fans.

Hanson, the nation's leading scorer in 1945, found his shooting eye tonight and poured 23 points through the hoop. But even Hanson was surpassed by Oregon's giant center, Roger Wiley, who bombarded the hoop for 24 points.

The game boiled down to a personal duel between Hanson and Wiley, Hanson racking up his points on a whirl shot and Wiley making rebound after rebound off the backboard.

The victory helped secure the Cougars' runner-up position to loop-leading Oregon State in Northern Division conference standings. The Ducks remain in fourth spot behind Washington.

Webfoot Guard Reedy Berg sank a long one to give Oregon a two-point margin 10 seconds before the end of the second half, but Hanson came right back and tied the score with two seconds to go, forcing the overtime at 59-all.

A field goal and free throw gave Oregon a three-point advantage early in the extra frame, but Cougar forward Ed Gayda tied it up again by tipping in a rebound and bucketing a gift toss.

Hanson then sank another field goal and free throw to shove WSC ahead. Little Stan Williamson, Duck guard, stole the ball in the final minute and made the score 66-65, but the Cougars stalled during the final seconds and still held

their one-point lead at the final horn.

The two teams meet here again tonight.

Roger vs Vince Highlights Tilts

Roger Wiley was up against a capable man last night in one Vince Hanson, big Cougar center. Starting the season as an alternate on Jack Friel's team, Hanson has suddenly blossomed forth into one of the top pivotmen in the Northern Division.

Hanson capped his upward climb Saturday night by scoring 18 points against the Idaho Vandals, who boast a six foot-eight incher of their own in Jack Phoenix. Phoenix managed to gather 12 points in the battle of the skyscrapers.

Hanson dropped out of the basketball picture last year, but made a name for himself during the 1944-1945 season. During that year he led the National collegiate scoring with 592 points, and also broke the Northern Division scoring mark by totaling 253 points.

Heldt's Frosh Shine in Scrimmage

If yesterday afternoon's scrimmage session is any indication, the Oregon Frosh basketball team is out for revenge against the Oregon State Rooks Friday night at Corvallis. Freshmen stock rose by leaps and bounds in the mind of anyone who witnessed the action in Mac court yesterday afternoon.

After running through their offensive plays, the Little Ducks took the floor in a long intra-squad game, which ended with the skins on the long end of a 74-61 decision over the shirts.

Keller Hot

Flashy Jack Keller, who poked in 11 field goals and one free toss for a 23-point afternoon, was the sparkplug for the skins. His team included Bob Taggesell, Gene Hoyer, Brad Fullerton, Gene Miner, Eob Ford, and Jerry Earde. Don Feterson headed the other team of Will Urban, Leroy Coleman, Ed-dit Artzt, Rod Slade, Dick Mase, and Roger Dasch.

Taggesell, who played a good game under the boards, was second high for the skins with 16 markers. Fullerton followed with 14. Newcomer Hoyer, looking good on under-the-basket break shots,

dumped 10 points through the hoop, while Hiner, a diver who is hard to check, came up with nine points.

Coleman Leads Shirts

Coleman led the shirts with 15 points, followed by Urban with 13, mostly on tricky lay-in shots. Mase, playing a steady, heads-up game, collected 12 points.

After breaking even in another pair of weekend tilts, the Ducklings have only one game this weekend, that being against the Rooks. Coach Carl Heldt's charges will be out to even things Friday night, after absorbing a 47-41 drubbing in the first Baby Beaver contest.
