

Prep Teachers Call Conference

Five University of Oregon professors, L. O. Wright, Edna Landros, Victor P. Morris, Maude Garnett, and Jean Kendall, will attend the high school work conference at Corvallis Thursday and Friday of this week.

The convention will be divided into five subject-sections, covering agriculture, art, audio-visual aids, business education, and foreign languages.

Jean Kendall, professor of art education, will lead the art section. The language subdivision will be headed by L. O. Wright and Edna Landros, both professors of Romance languages.

Conference leaders will be aided by high school teachers from Benton, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, and Polk counties. Meetings will include discussions on better methods of teaching and training.

Opening the general conference Thursday morning will be a singing session led by Maude Garnett, professor of music education.

Victor P. Morris, dean of the school of business administration will address the entire group Thursday evening. His subject will be "Quest for a Better World."

Professors from Oregon State college will constitute the remainder of the college group attending. Speakers from OSC include Frank Zeron, dean of education, and A. L. strand, president of the college.

D.M. Dougherty Receives Books

A gift of gratitude from the University of Geneva to D. M. Dougherty, head of the Romance language department, arrived recently in the form of a rare four-volume history of the ancient college.

Dougherty was in charge of the junior group at the University of Geneva in 1946-47. He was also in charge of admitting American students under the GI bill.

Before his position in Switzerland, Dougherty was a language professor at Clark university, Massachusetts. He came to Oregon in fall, 1947.

The four volumes contain the history of the University of Geneva from its founding by Calvin in 1559 to modern times. Entirely written in French, the history is illustrated with prints from priceless early woodcuts.

The books are bound in white lambskin, and each cover is embossed in gold with the seal of the University.
