Suggested **Bill Will Affect** GI Subsistance

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3-(UP)-The house today unexpectedly shelved other business and took up legislation to increase the benefits for veterans who are studying under the GI bill of rights. Chairman Edith Nourse Rogers, R., Mass., of the house veterans committee moved to suspend regular procedures and consider the legislation. The first bill would affect veterans training under an apprenticeship program. A veteran in training may now receive a total income of \$175 a month if he is still single and \$200 if he has dependents. The new proposal would allow him \$250 when single, \$325 with one dependent and \$350 for more than one dependent. Another measure on the program would increase subsistence payments to veterans enrolled in regular schools. This would authorize monthly payments of \$75 to single veterans, \$105 to veterans with one dependent and \$120 to veterans with more than one dependent.

The committee each week prepares a summary of news of local. national, and international importance. It requests each house to read the bulletin and post it.




