# **Increased Fee Rumors Declared Premature;** Termed · Last Resort'

### **UO Officials, Executive Council Studying** Methods for Increasing Athletic Revenue

#### By JIM WALLACE

There will be no raise in student fees this year or next to increase the athletic budget, administrative officials announced yesterday. It was emphasized that although various methods for raising athletic revenue are under consideration, a tuition boost at any time in the future would definitely be a last resort measure.

In explaining the situation that had given rise to the tuitionboost rumor, Leo Harris, director of athletics, said that the department's expenses had exceeded the income for the past

two years. Methods of balancing the budget, either by increasing revenues or cutting down expenses are being studied and must be found, declared Harris.

**Harris Cites Choice** The choice, asserted Harris, lies between raising more money for athletics or cutting down on expenses. If the cut comes, he continued, it will mean, among other things, sending traveling squads second-class, sending smaller squads, and less participation in the minor and non-paying sports.

Harris said that although the 1947 football season made money there would be a demicit of about \$15,000 in the athletic budget by the end of the year. He added that a similar condition existed in 1946. Action must be taken to balance this budget in some way, he continued.
