### THE GETTYSBURG ADDRESS

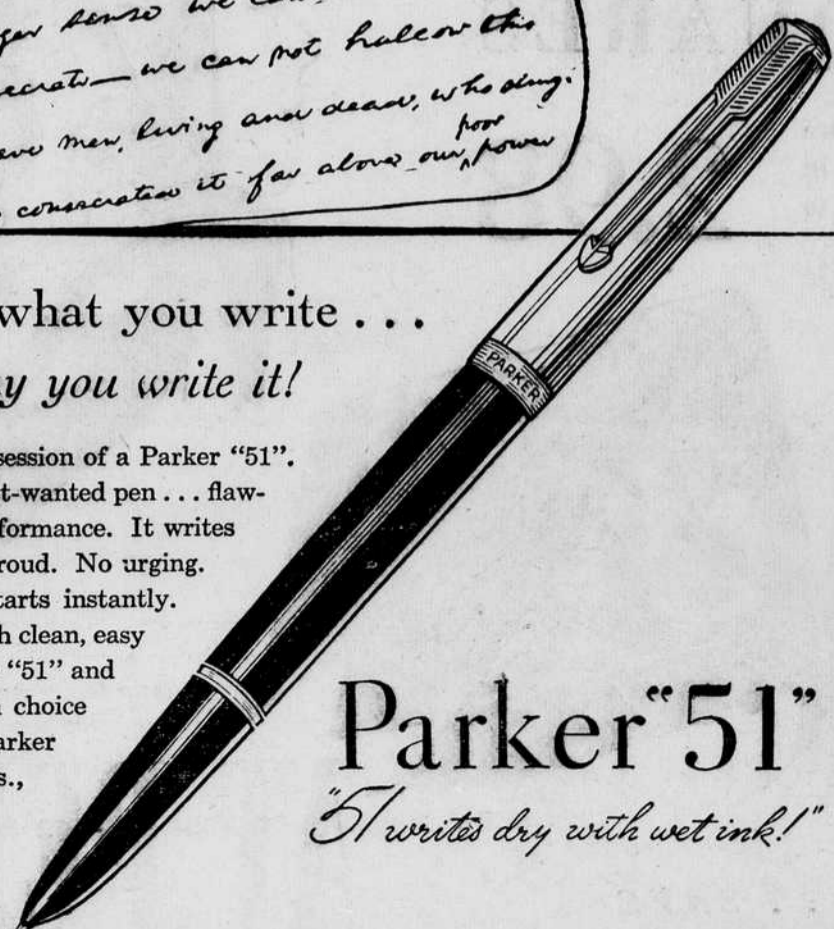
