

# Constitution Revisions For YW Up For Vote

Proposed revisions in the YWCA constitution and by-laws have been suggested and a two-thirds vote is necessary for the changes to become effective. These revisions will be voted on at the "Y"-WAA-AWS polls Tuesday. The revisions in the constitution and by-laws are "to change all places in constitution and by-laws where the title "General Secretary" is used to read "Executive Director."

Proposed constitutional changes are: Article IV, Officers; Section 1—Add: Positions of first and second vice-president in place of vice-president.

Section 3:  
Reads: "If any vacancy occurs in the list of officers it shall be filled at the next business meeting of the Association of a special business meeting called for that purpose."

To read: "—filled at the next business meeting of the cabinet."

Article VI: Meetings.  
To add: Section 1: "The annual meeting shall be held not later than the second week of Spring Term."

**Proposed By-Laws Changes**  
Article II—Election of Officers, Section 1—Time.

Reads: "Election of officers shall be held the last of the Winter Term at the same time as the other women's organizations."

To read: "— shall be held not later than the second week of Spring Term."

Section 2—Elective Officers.  
Add: Positions of first and second vice-president in place of vice-president.

Section 4—Appointive Officers.  
Reads: "The president shall appoint chairman of standing committees."

To read: "The president shall appoint with the advice and consent of the cabinet—"

Section 5—Vacancies.  
Reads: "filled by president."

To read: "—filled by president with advice and consent of the cabinet."

Article III—Duties of Officers.  
To delete Section 2—Vice-President.

To add: Section 2: First Vice-President.  
It shall be the duty of the First

Vice-President (1) to perform the duties of the president in her absence (2) to act for the president on such committees or commissions of the Association, or on committees of the campus or community as shall be delegated to her (3) to submit a report of each term's work (4) to perform such other duties as usually pertain to her office.

Section III: It shall be the duty of the Second Vice-President (1) to act as chairman for freshman program and its leadership (2) to act for the president on such committees or commissions as shall be appointed to her (3) to submit a report of each term's work (4) to perform such other duties as usually pertain to her office.

logical science or a similar field. If possible, the film is to be shown to classes of both boys and girls, primarily for grades six to nine, and is followed by a group discussion.

The picture is produced by the E. C. Brown trust created from the \$500,000 will of Dr. E. C. Brown of Portland. His will provided that income from the estate be paid to the University of Oregon for the purpose of furthering social hygiene instruction in Oregon. Last year Dr. Lester F. Beck was made film adviser to the trust.

Dr. Adolph Weinzirl, director of the trust and supervisor of the motion picture project, is now traveling in the east showing the film to interested groups and obtaining their endorsements. The picture has already been approved by the American Social Hygiene association, the National Education association, the U. S. office of education, and the Federated Council of Churches.

### Oregon Approves

Within the state, use of the film has been approved by the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers which is sponsoring it, by the office of the state superintendent of public instruction in accordance with a policy issued by Dr. Rex Putnam and by the Junior High School Principals' association. Use of the picture is optional in the Oregon schools. The recommended procedure is to first show the film

and gain approval by parent-teacher groups, and then present it to the students.

During the past two or three months members of the psychology department, under the supervision of Dr. Beck and Miss Marcille Harris, graduate student in psychology, have been making test showings of the film to parent and school groups throughout the state. Tabulations have been completed for over 5000 persons who have seen the film. Approximately 98 per cent of these endorse it.

National comment is evidenced in a recent editorial column in the Chicago Sun-Times by Herb Grafie: "Unless I miss my carefully considered guess a long, long way, this picture is a historical achievement in pioneering protection of youngsters against prurient gossip, fence filth and other dirty distortions of facts which a child first faces with a clean and healthy curiosity . . . Eventually this film will be worth far more to the happiness, health and purity of American children than all the Oscar winners ever made."

### Info Requested

Among the nationally known magazines requesting information on the film are the Ladies Home Journal, Parade, N. E. A. Journal, the publication of the U. S. office of education, audio-visual journals, and several lesser magazines.

Three main objectives are achieved in the film: it shows parents how sex education can be taught in a beneficial and acceptable manner, it aids the teachers as an instructional supplement, and it creates an exemplary teacher-pupil relationship resulting in more classroom discussions.

The Edlie Albert Productions of Hollywood filmed the movie with Eddie Albert personally supervising the project. John E. Fletcher was production manager. Artists for the animated drawings were John Hubley and Phil Eastman of the United Productions of America.
