VA Stresses Hospital Rule

Veterans should make certain that bed space is available before starting travel to a veterans administration hospital, Donald C. Schworer, veterans administration contact representative at the University, emphasized yesterday.

Instances have occurred recently where ex-servicemen here have traveled long distances only to find they could not be admitted.

Should Check
An advance check through any veterans administration hospitals under a priority system, on this basis (1) Emergency cases; (2) treatment for injuries or diseases incurred or made worse from war service; (3) permanently disabling illnesses not due to service, such as tuberculosis and neuropsychiatric diseases; (4) all other non-service connected diseases or disabilities.

When a bed is available in a veterans administration hospital, a veteran with a non-service connected illness is given treatment, provided he signs an affidavit stating he cannot afford private hospital care.

No Delay
In the Pacific Northwest, the veterans administration is able to treat without delay all emergency and service-connected cases and most tuberculosis and neuropsychiatric cases, Schworer emphasized.

However, some veterans administration hospitals have waiting lists for veterans with non-service connected disabilities. In such cases, a veteran is called in for hospital care when a bed becomes available and as soon as his name comes up on the waiting list.

A native of the Republic of Columbia, Dr. Vargas spoke informally to the senior editing class in the journalism school, and urged American aid for the South American republics as insurance against further uprisings.

"People will look for help from where they can get it, he told the students.
