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Band Appropriation Refused

Ed Act Board Decides Against Special Sum

A request for a special appropriation to aid in sending the football band to the Oregon-Washington game in Seattle November 6 was rejected yesterday afternoon by the educational activities board.

Meeting in special session, the board decided that the trip could not be classed as an educational activity. Therefore, the board concluded, it lacked the power to make such an appropriation.

Whether or not this action has killed all chances to send the band to the Seattle game could not be determined last night.

A similar request for an appropriation had been turned down earlier by the Oregon Federation, an organization composed of alumni and friends of the University.

The vote by the educational activities board came after an hour-long discussion of the situation. All members of the board voted against the proposal. The board seemed generally agreed, however, that the presence of the band in Seattle would be a good thing for the University.

In rejecting the request, it seemed clear, the board was in accord in the belief that its relegated powers would be exceeded were it to grant the appropriation.
