Inquiries led me to the offices of of Karl W. Onthank, Associate Dean of Student Affairs, who explained the whole thing. The dean informed me that the scale model was constructed in 1915 by the Portland firm of Lawrence and Holford, architects. The former of these, Ellis F. Lawrence, was dean of the School of Arch itecture and official architect for the University.


