

Radio Honorary To Be Organized

An organizational meeting will be held Friday, January 7, at 8 p.m. in Studio A of the extension building for the purpose of forming a radio honorary.

Theta Sigma Phi Lunch to Honor Oregon Author

Martha Ferguson McKeown, author of a recent book on early life in the Pacific Northwest, will be honored at a Theta Sigma Phi luncheon at noon Saturday at the Faculty club.

Students and faculty interested in journalism and literature are invited to attend the semi-formal luncheon. Reservations may be made at the school of journalism.

Mrs. McKeown's book, "The Trail Led North," published this fall by the MacMillan company, is an account of the tales spun by her uncle, Mont Hawthorne, of his life in the Northwest before the turn of the century. It is written in his own language to preserve the character of the story. Both the style of the book and one of its main characters, the faithful bumbling dog Pedro, have received much favorable comment from literary critics.

"The Trail Led North" is the first in a proposed trilogy on the life of Uncle Mont, according to Mrs. McKeown. She has planned one book to tell of his days on the plains as a boy and another about his life since settling on a Hood River farm.

Mrs. McKeown, who received her master's degree in English from the University in 1938, is a former dean of women of Multnomah college in Portland.

Pledges to Theta Sigma Phi, national professional fraternity for women in journalism, will be tapped at the luncheon.

Early Fire Guts School

WILLAMETTE, Ore., Jan. 5—(AP)—A fast-spreading fire gutted the \$300,000 Willamette grade school today, less than an hour before the school would have been filled with 225 pupils.

The flames burst out before school opened this morning. Class-bound pupils rescued some manual training equipment and library books, but most of the furnishings were destroyed.

Minor Davidson, the school janitor, said the fire started about 8 a.m., and spread to several different sections even before he could sound the alarm.

Fire officials said the blaze might have been caused by a boiler exploding, or by wiring. It apparently spread beneath the floors.

This was the second Clackamas county school burned within a year. The Lake Grove high school burned down early in 1948.

Willamette's 225 pupils will be sent to other grade schools in the county, until a new structure is built.

Alum Adviser Group Set Up

An alumni committee has been set up in the San Francisco area to serve as advisers to Oregon students and alumni wishing to work in that area, Karl W. Onthank, director of personnel administration, revealed yesterday.

"A similar committee is functioning very well in the Los Angeles area," said Onthank. "The San Francisco committee was appointed by Walter Hempy, president of the alumni club there."

This new group is expected to aid Oregon by providing new contacts with employers and firms in the Bay area, Onthank added.
