Church Starts Class

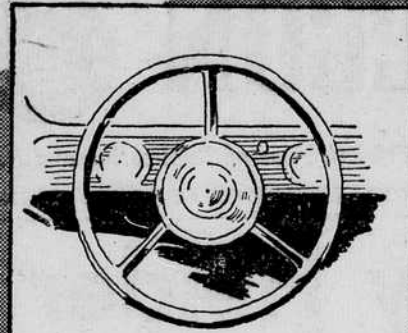
A college class will be organized at the First Methodist church Sunday, January 16, at 9:45 a. m. All students who are interested are invited to attend the class.

Beauty, Appeal All From 3-hour Hike

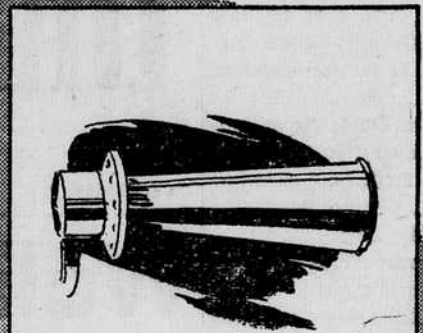
