The Redwings, playing their second year of hockey and now a member team of the Oregon Hockey League, consist largely of University of Oregon players who were instrumental in the Redwing win over a potent Salem Hornet aggregation last Sunday.

Seniors Frank Sauer and Roger Newton, together with high-scoring John Olson, make up one of the powerful student combinations used to advantage by Coach Tommy Ferris, while fast-skating Don Severson rounds out the forward wall together with "townies" Tom and Dick Gillespie, Ferris, Gene Thiessen and Joe Worth.

New Grid Rules Favor Offensive

PALM SPRINGS, Calif., Jan. 15 (AP)—There won't be much difference in the matter of wholesale substitutions running on and off college football fields next Fall, but the game will be a little more exciting and a little less rough.

Such were the deductions yesterday as members of the Intercollegiate Rules committee headed homeward after another tussle to improve the grid regulation book.

The highly controversial free substitution rule rated top attention. Admittedly, according to William J. Bingham, of Harvard, chairman, this provoked hot debate in closed door sessions during the snowbound four-day session.

No Single Substitutions
 Here are the new statutes on the subject:

Coaches will not be permitted to send one player at a time into the game while the clock is running.

They will be able, when the ball changes hands, to send in as many players as desired on either team. But subs must be in and ready to play while the clock is running and before the customary 25-second period elapses from the time the referee placed the ball in position.

Encouragement to offense is contained in these rules:

A player can elect to run back a punt from scrimmage if the ball is caught in the end zone. This used to be an automatic touchback.

Still a Touchback

If a punt receiver gets nailed in the end zone, it still goes as a touchback and the ball goes to the 20-yard line. If he is tackled on the one-yard line, that's where it goes into play.
