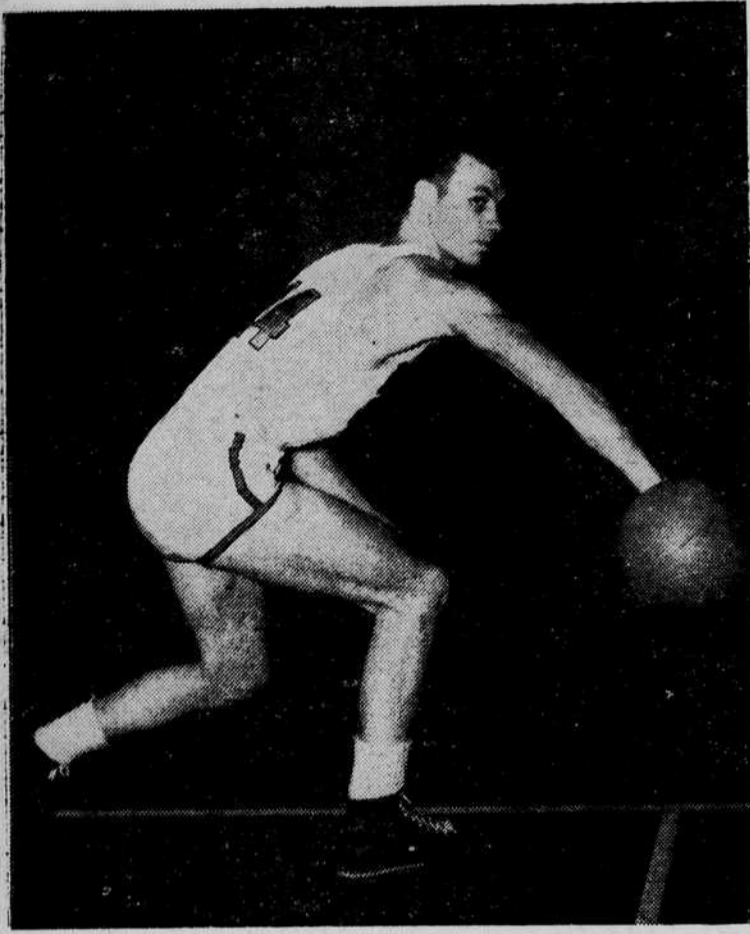

Son of Swedish Miler Loses Eye in Accident

NEW YORK, Jan. 25—While Ingvar Bengtsson won two U. S. indoor track victories last weekend, the Swedish Olympic star's four-year-old son lost the sight of one eye in an accident back home, AAU Secretary Dan Ferris disclosed here today.

As a result, Bengtsson will depart for his home at Gayle, Sweden, immediately after the National AAU indoor championships February 19, instead of competing throughout the indoor season as he had planned.

Ferris told New York track writers at their weekly luncheon meeting that Bengtsson's son had acci-

dentally jabbed a fork into his eye, according to word received by the runner from Sweden.

Bengtsson will go through with plans to run in the Millrose games here Saturday, the Boston Athletic association meet Feb. 5 and the New York Athletic club meet Feb. 12, in addition to the AAU meet, Ferris said.

His early departure will cause him to miss a scheduled invitation appearance at the IC4A meet here Feb. 26 and competition in other meets scheduled in March at New York, Cleveland, Chicago, Montreal, and Hamilton, Ont.

Erik Ahlden, Bengtsson's Swedish countryman who also scored a pair of two-mile victories in as many nights last weekend, will remain to compete in all the meets.

Hamilton Leaves Service For Pitt

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Jan. 25 (AP) Tom Hamilton wound up today within a short distance of where more than 25 years ago he started a Navy career which prominently identified him with athletics.

The big Navy officer went across the river to the North Severn Activities Center to be separated from the service. He had been marking time for a month, waiting to take over as Athletic Director at Pittsburgh.

He will be officially retired on Feb. 1. Then he will be promoted from captain to rear admiral.

Hamilton requested retirement in December to take the Pitt job. In accepting, he had said his place was in athletics, intimating the Navy had no such long-time position for him.

Blackbirds Picked Over Duck Quint

Though not listed as one of the top teams in the country, LIU will come onto the floor Friday night a heavy favorite over Oregon. The Blackbirds will boast a better record and a greater all-around height advantage than the home town Webfoots.

John Warren sent his charges through another long drill yesterday in readying them for the coming series. And again, the Oregon Frosh were the opposition for the drill.

Both teams looked a little sharper than they had on Monday, but still a long way from their top performances of the season. The Webfoots will have to be in top shape against Clair Bee and his invaders if they are to cop either of the games.

LIU is a "mystery" team, little being known about them. They have a 12-won 5-lost record before their series here against some of the better teams in the East. And they have a big front line. White and Sherer are both six inches above the six foot mark, and French is only an inch shorter.

Also expected to be in the lineup is Lipman, who bucketed 24 points in the last meeting of the two quints. That was in Madison Square Garden last year.

The big LIU front line is expected to cause the Ducks lots of trouble

and might well bring 6-foot 8-inch Bob Amacher into the lineup. He will probably see plenty of action whether he starts or not.

Bee is expected to use a slow, Eastern style of attack, with the emphasis on ball control. The Blackbirds are exponents of set plays and two handed shooting, neither of which are very common on the Pacific Coast today.

The Webfoots, led by the leading scorer in the Northern Division, Roger Wiley, are expected to improve on their poor shooting from the field against Washington. In Seattle, the Webfoots only hit 21 and 18 per cent of their shots from the field.

A correction in the official scoring already released gives Paul Sowers, Duck guard, a tie for second place in scoring with Bill Vandenburg. Both hoopsters have 71 tallies. Roger Wiley, with 105, is still setting the pace.

As usual, the Frosh will play preliminary games before the varsity tilts. Friday night they meet the highly-touted Cottage Grove quint, one of the powerhouses in District Six. Saturday night it will be Central Catholic of Portland, coached by a former Webfoot star, Roy Seeborg.

Cougars Almost to 1,000 Point Mark

PULLMAN, Jan. 25 (AP)—Win, lose, or draw, the University of Idaho will have a tough time keeping the Washington State college basketball team from scoring its 1000th point Saturday night.

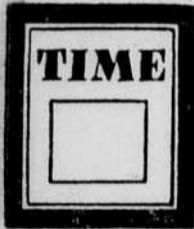
Smith, Hein Listed As PU Possibilities
