

# Modern Dance Artist Programs Exhibition

Merce Cunningham, modern dance artist, will present a program of dances on Thursday, February 10, 8 p. m., in Gerlinger gym.

Among the eight numbers on his program will be "A Diversion," "Root of an Unfocus" and "Monkey Dances." John Cage, composer of the majority of Cunningham's dances, will accompany him on the piano.

Cunningham, born in Centralia, Washington, studied at the Cornish School in Seattle and then joined the company of Martha Graham where he spent several years as soloist. At the present time he is conducting professional dance classes in New York City.

In February, 1948, Cunningham lectured on dance at the National Intercollegiate Arts Conference held at Vassar college, and in the summer of the same year was instructor in dance at Black Mountain college in North Carolina. While at Black Mountain he created the dances for, and performed the role of the monkey in "The Ruse of Meduse" by Erik Satie.

Registration cards will admit students to the performance free of charge, while faculty members and non-students will be required to purchase tickets, costing \$1.20 each.

Sponsoring the program are the school of health and physical education, the educational activities board, and patronesses and alumnae of Phi Beta, women's national professional music and speech fraternity.

The audience will be admitted through the southwest sunporch and northwest doors.

## Vets Warned Against Frauds

Veterans of this area who are urged by a solicitor to enroll in a trade or correspondence school should check with the Veterans' administration if they plan to study under the GI bill, Donald C. Schworer, VA representative warned today.

"Numerous instances of questionable soliciting for schools have come to light in Oregon this winter," Schworer pointed out. "Veterans have lost both money and time under the GI bill because of misunderstandings which the solicitors apparently fostered."

The VA representative outlined these pointers:

1. No solicitors represent the VA or carry its endorsement. The VA promotes no schools, but a veteran may learn of an approved school by inquiring.

2. No down payment is necessary for any veteran eligible under the GI bill. He needs only a VA certifi-

cate of eligibility to be enrolled. 3. Vocational advisement services are available without charge, through the VA, and these do not promote particular schools.

4. A careful check should be made on any promises of housing, part-time work while attending school or employment after graduation.

Better Business bureaus have specific information on the standings of schools and their job prospects.

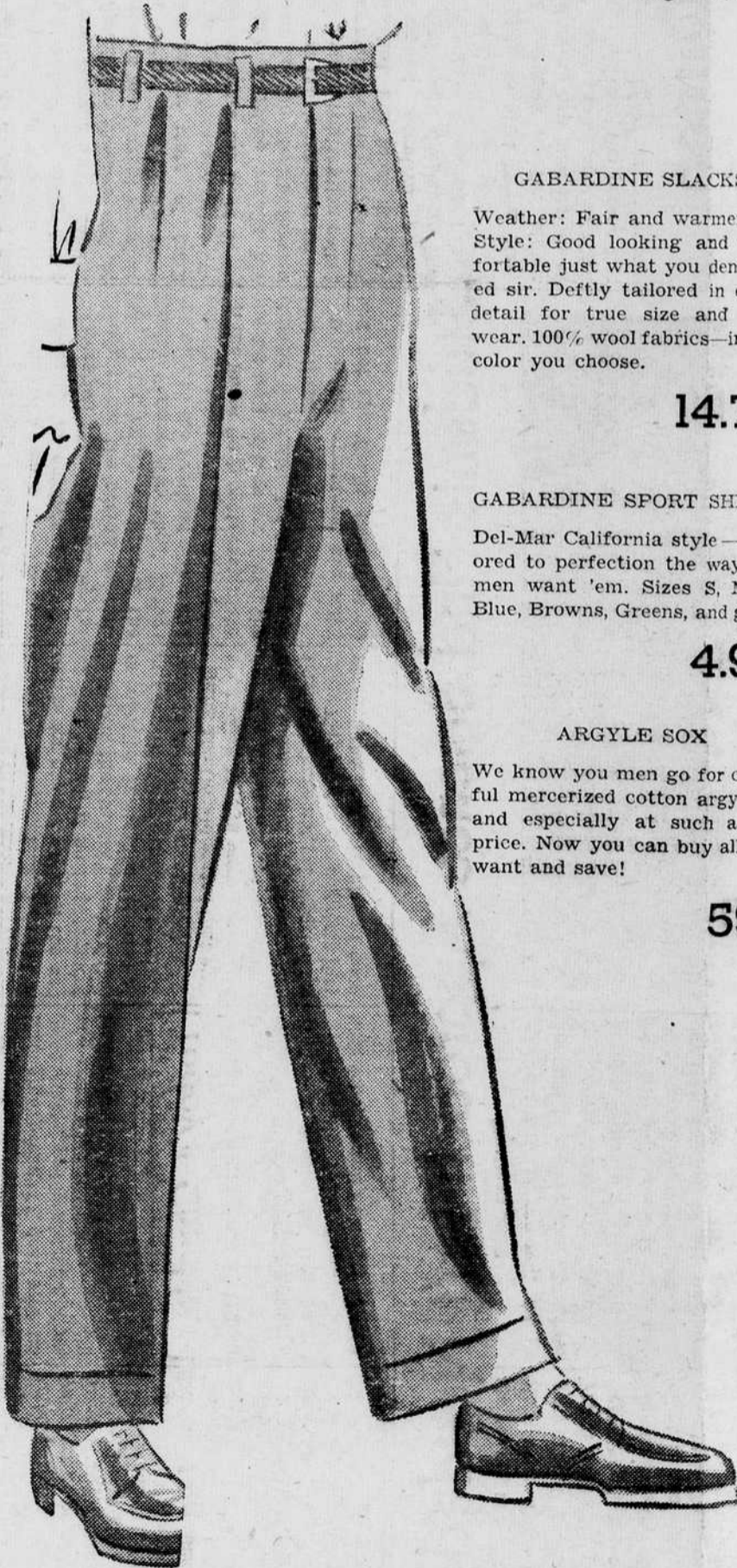
