Army States Qualifications For Commission

College graduates who served as commissioned officers in any of the armed forces during World War II, may apply for regular army commissions as second lieutenants, Col. F. R. Maerdian, head of the military science department announced yesterday.

Seniors who will graduate this spring also are eligible to apply. To be eligible under the new plan, Col. Maerdian explained, applicants must:

Have at least one year of honorable, active, commissioned service in any component of the armed forces between December 7, 1941,

and September 2, 1945.

Have graduated from an accredited college or university.

Be between 21 and 27 years of age at the time of appointment.

Be physically qualified.

Be of high moral character and have a record free of conviction by military or civil court for other than minor traffic violations.

Not be or have been a member of any foreign or domestic organization advocating subversive policy or seeking to alter the form of government of the United States by unconstitutional means.

Col. Maerdian explained that if an applicant has not been graduated from college, the estimated graduation date will be given on the applications, together with a statement of verification by an appropriate official of the school.

Applicants holding commissions

in the Officers' Reserve Corps or National guard are to submit applications through regular channels to the major commander. Other applicants not on active duty will submit applications direct to the major United States commander concerned.

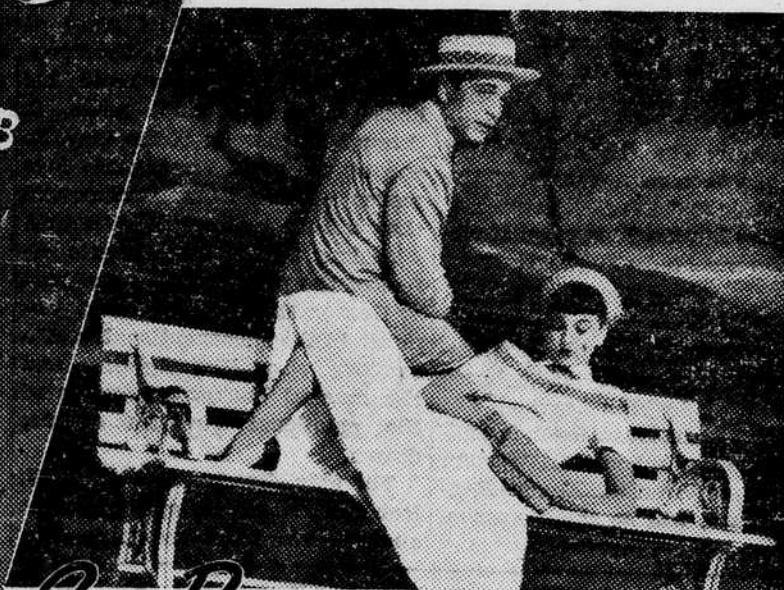
