Taking another aspect of the situation which has consistently made headlines in the UW Daily in recent weeks, chemistry department head A. H. Kunz, UO chapter president of the American Association of University Professors, defined the position of the AAUP on college campuses.

The AAUP has been under considerable pressure at Washington to take action on the dismissal of the "red" professors. Student members of the Student Organization for Academic Rights sent 150 petitions for protest to the AAUP, hoping for action.

According to Dr. Kunz, the AAUP attempts to obtain fair consideration for all faculty members whose positions are threatened. In this case, the SOAR desired the AAUP to demand further consideration of the dismissed professors. As yet it is not apparent what stand, if any, the UW chapter of AAUP will take in the controversy.

Other functions of the AAUP, as explained by Kunz, have to do with tenure and the general welfare of the faculty as a whole. AAUP is not a labor union, but more of a safeguard against unfair administrative action, as explained by Dr. Kunz.

"During the history of AAUP on the Oregon campus, we have always been able to find a solution, in collaboration with the administration, to any problems which have come up."

**Entry Date Set For All-Campus Ping Pong Meet**

The third annual all-University table tennis tournament will be sponsored by the YMCA beginning February 15. Each of the men's living organizations is eligible to enter a team of two players. The winning houses will receive a cup which is now on display in the Co-op. The name of the house will be engraved on the cup and the house may keep it until the tournament next year.

All entries must be in the YMCA by February 10. The entry fee will be \$1.00 per house. The houses are asked to have their individual play-off tournaments completed by February 8 and to turn in their entries as soon as possible.

March 21 is the deadline for playing the first round matches.

In addition to the house tournament, the Y will sponsor an individual tournament in which any student may compete except those who are entered in house tournaments.

Registration fee for the individual tournament will be 25 cents per person. February 10 is the deadline for registering in the individual tournament.

Trophies will be awarded to the winners and the runners-up.

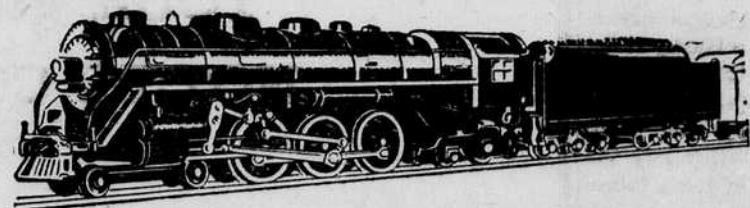
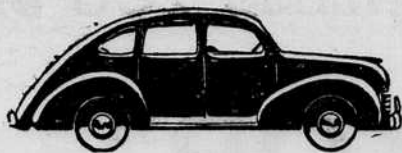
