

Baritone's Recital Planned for Sunday

Wayne Sherwood, senior in music, will present a voice recital Sunday, February 13, at 4 p. m. in the school of music auditorium.

Accompanying the baritone Sherwood, will be Sylvia Killman, graduate student in music, who has been his accompanist since they were seniors together at Franklin high school in Portland.

Included in the singer's program will be a cycle of two songs, "The Fly" and "The Sick Rose," written especially for Sherwood by Thad Elvigion, University graduate student in piano composition. Elvigion recently completed these two numbers and they will be sung for the first time Sunday.

Among other numbers to be sung by Sherwood are "Crede" from "Othello" by Verdi, "Do You Remember" by Levitzki, "Sailors" by Wolfe and "Vier ernste Gesange" by Brahms. The Brahms selection, a favorite of Sherwood's, is taken from the Bible.

This is Sherwood's third year at the University. He attended Multnomah junior college in Portland

for two years before spending a year with the Navy in welfare and recreation work. While in the Navy he toured with an USO show titled "Salt Water Daffy."

During his University career he was soloist in "The Messiah," by Handel, played the romantic male lead of "Mac Heath" in "The Beggar's Opera" by John Gay and portrayed "Figaro" in the "Marriage of Figaro" by Mozart. He is also a member of Psi chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, men's professional music fraternity.

Last year Sherwood appeared with the Portland Symphony orchestra as a result of taking first place in the men's vocal division of the state-wide Symphony Young Artist contest.

Radio has also claimed Sherwood's vocal talents. He wrote and presented his own 15 minute program over KPFM in Portland during the summer of 1947. In addition he has sung over station KOIN in Portland and KORE in Eugene.

There will be no admission charge for Sunday's program.

UO Delegates To Attend Meet On Personnel

Eleven university officials and faculty members are now in Portland attending the annual conference of the Northwest Council of Guidance and Personnel associations.

The three-day meeting, which began yesterday, has as its theme "Personnel Work: Time to Take Stock." It will include special sections on all phases of high school and college personnel work.

Speakers from the University will include Leona E. Tyler, associate professor of psychology, who will act as chairman of the general session "Aggressive Attitudes and the Counseling Process."

Also speaking on this subject will be Paul Eiserer, assistant professor of education and psychology.

Other UO speakers are J. S. Carlson, director of the counseling center, who will discuss "Pre-Testing and Pre-Counseling for High School Graduates," and Robert Clark, assistant to the dean of the college of liberal arts, who will represent the college teacher in the

panel discussion, "Taking Stock of the Teaching Faculty's Role in the Personnel Program."

The Oregon delegation to the conference includes Prof. Tyler, Mr. Carlson, Prof. Eiserer, Assistant Dean Clark, C. L. Constance, registrar, J. D. Kline, assistant registrar, Mrs. Golda Wickham, director of women's affairs, D. M. DuShane, director of student affairs, V. S. Fogdall, director of men's affairs, K. W. Onthank, director, graduate placement service, and H. C. McMurtry, assistant professor of psychology.

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Atom Bomb Discussion To Be Held

Control of atomic energy will be the problem discussed at a joint International Relations club—United World Federalists meeting at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday in 207 Chapman.

Forum speakers will be Egeert Wengert, head of the political science school, and R. T. Ellickson, associate dean of the graduate school and professor of physics.

In 1946 Wengert worked with the Atomic Energy commission in transferring atomic control from military to civilian hands. Ellickson was a physicist at Oakridge while the bomb was still a top secret.

Glenn Morgan, IRC president, said the subject had reached a new phase of seriousness since "the action of the United Nations Atomic Energy Committee in ceasing to meet in view of the lack U. S.—Russ agreement."

Herb Weiss, president of the Eugene Student Federalists of the UWF, said "atomic control is a serious question and should be handled by the UN."

"This was impossible in the past because of lack of UN authority over the member nations."

"Our purpose in presenting this problem is to clarify the issue in the hope that people will come to realize the necessity for a strong international government."

Following the forum, the film "Where Will You Hide," concerning the effects of an atom bombing, will be shown through the auspices of the Audio Visual department.

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
