

Student Cast Will Give War Play In March--Oestreich Plays Lead

Tickets for "Command Decision," fourth production of the University theater, go on sale to the general public today. They may be purchased at the Johnson hall box office from 10 to 12 in the morning and 1 to 5 every afternoon.

The play is scheduled to open this Friday evening, and will run March 4-5, and 7-10. It deals with the responsibility of command, and is the story of an air-force general who is forced to send his bombers deep into Germany, with resulting high losses. Although the target is a vital one, his plan is interrupted by the arrival of his commanding general, and later by two visiting congressmen.

Elvin Oestreich will play General Dennis, the lead role, in his first theater appearance. Cliff James is cast as Dennis' superior, Maj. Gen. Kane, while Bob Croisant plays

General Garnett. James Shaffer and Roald Grunseth are the two congressmen.

Other members of the cast include Bob Miller, Earl Taylor, Ken Neal, Gordon Erickson, Gene Deutschman, Phil Bevans, Bob Chambers, George Dorris, Frank Fairly, Wayne Wagner, Bill Wilson, and Jack Evans.
