

Webfoots Down Cougars, 8-6

Ducks Protect Loop Lead By Taking Third ND Go

"Buck" Bailey brought his clowning and the Washington State Cougars to town yesterday, and between verbal blasts from the bench and a steady parade of pitchers to the firing line, they went down to an 8-6 upset defeat at the hands of Oregon's Ducks.

This afternoon at 3 o'clock the two clubs do a re-match on Howe Field.

With Sophomore Righthander Mel Krause serving 'em up in puzzling style, Don Kirsch's boys managed an early second-inning lead and the defending-champion Cougars never caught up. Krause gave up only eight hits, but wildness hurt him considerably.

Meanwhile, Johnny Kovenz and Al Cohen were flailing away with plenty of guts, each batting in two runs, the former with three hits, and the latter with two, including a long homer to left.

That four-baser, which came off the slants of Arnie Torgerson, first of three WSC hurlers, and the loser, knotted things in the first inning. The visitors had assumed a temporary lead when Bob McGuire scored from third on Ed Coleman's infield hopper that was converted into the first of four Oregon double plays.

THE DUCKS had things pretty much to themselves in their five-run second inning.

Don Kimball started things innocently enough by drawing a walk. He zipped to third on pat Wohler's two bagger and then pounded home on a passed ball.

A pass to Walt Kirsch and the first of the two infield scratchers

by Krause loaded 'em up. Kovenz promptly punched in two runs with a double, and then Krause came across with the fourth run of the frame on Hal Zurcher's long fly to left. Dick Bartle's two-base drive sent Kovenz in and the threat subsided.

WSC SNAPPED back with two runs in each of the third and fourth. Tom Marier's resounding triple following two walks accounted for both markers in the third, that being his first of three safeties in as many trips.

Two more walks plus McGuire's double provided the major damage in the fourth, and with a high fly to the garden, brought in that run, too, Clayton, Carr scoring after he had initiated the inning with a double.

Meanwhile, Oregon put the matter out of reach with singletons in the fifth and eighth. A fancy bit of hustling by Kovenz made for one run. After singling and stealing second, he scored all the way from that point on Cohen's infield hit to deep short. Kovenz also scored in the eighth for his third of the afternoon, gliding in on a fielder's choice.

PARTICULARLY encouraging, from an Oregon standpoint, was the glistening fielding performance turned in. These four lightning-like double-plays were something of a Godsend, and was an abrupt turn-about from the sloppy defensive work displayed by the team before yesterday.

Bob Arps, as well as Marier, was the bright light for WSC. In the seven relief innings he hurled, he allowed only four hits and two runs.

As for Bailey, he didn't grab any umpires by the lapels, but that booming basso could be heard from the dugout to Friendly Hall. The big fellow may be getting old, but he's still got plenty of fire to throw around the lot.

Oregon's improving varsity tennis men made it two straight wins Saturday, as they stroked to a 6-1 triumph over the Lewis and Clark Pioneers on the local courts.

Bill Preble, Pioneer top man, gained the day's only win for his squad by defeating Bob Carey in a three-set affair, 4-6, 6-3, 9-7. The Webfoots swept the remaining contests.

Dave Van Zandt trounced Lewis Wahl by a 6-3, 6-1, count; Coach Saal Lesser dropped Ray Howie, 6-4, 6-4; Warren Fleming edged Willard Gish in a torrid 6-2, 15-13 duel; and Bud Carpenter disposed of Ed Hordt in another close one, 6-3 and 7-5.

In doubles, Oregon's top duo of Lesser and Van Zandt came back to whip Preble and Gish by a 6-8, 6-1, 6-3 margin, while Bob Mensor and Bill Williams, also of Oregon, won a 6-2, 3-6, 6-2 decision.

The Pioneers, defeated once previously, played tight tennis in bowing to the Ducks.

Six New O-I Meet Records Set As Bowerman's Thinclads Win

Breaking six meet records during the afternoon, Coach Bill Bowerman's Webfoot trackmen defeated the Idaho Vandals 76 1/2 to 54 1/2 in their dual meet on Hayward Field last Saturday.

The Ducks journey to Pullman this weekend to tackle the powerful WSC Cougars in their second Northern Division test.

Most spectacular performance of the Vandal-Duck affair was turned in by Oregon's vault squad, led by George Rasmussen. "Ras" established a new meet mark of 14 feet and cleared the crossbar at 14 feet 6 inches three times, but each time knocked the bar down with his elbow as he began his descent.

Don Pickens and Lloyd Hickok, Webfoot number two and three

vaulters, both beat the previous record of 12 feet 9 inches. Pickens leaped 13 feet, 6 inches, while Hickok went 13 feet.

Other Oregon record-breakers were Davey Henthorne in a 10-flat century, Woodley Lewis in the broad jump, with a leap of 22 feet, 9 inches, Bob Anderson in the discus, who tossed the slab 144 feet, 3 inches, and Walt McClure in the 880-yard run in 1:59.8.

Keith Bean, high-stepping Idaho hurdler, set new marks in both the 120 highs and the 220 lows.

The invaders captured the round-up event of the afternoon, the mile relay, after they had made a clean sweep in the two-mile run to gain a majority of their points.

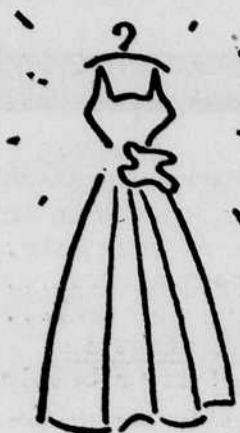
