'Human Growth' Wins Approval

"Human Growth," a sex-education film for junior high school students, is being nationally received as a means of presenting sex education in schools according to the responses of questionnaires which have been sent to parents and teachers wherever the film has been shown.

Script for the film was written by Dr. Lester Beck, associate professor of psychology here at Oregon. He also supervised production and served as technical advisor while the film was being made, and has written a book containing supplementary information to be used along with showing of the movie.

Prior to the release of the film, a survey was taken of the reactions of 5000 parents, teachers, and others in Oregon. The results found 97.7 per cent of the group in favor of having their children see the picture. Percentages received from the questionnaires since then have remained high, according to Curtis E. Avery, director of the E. C. Brown trust.

The film has been endorsed by the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, the American Social Hygiene Association, and the American College of Surgeons.

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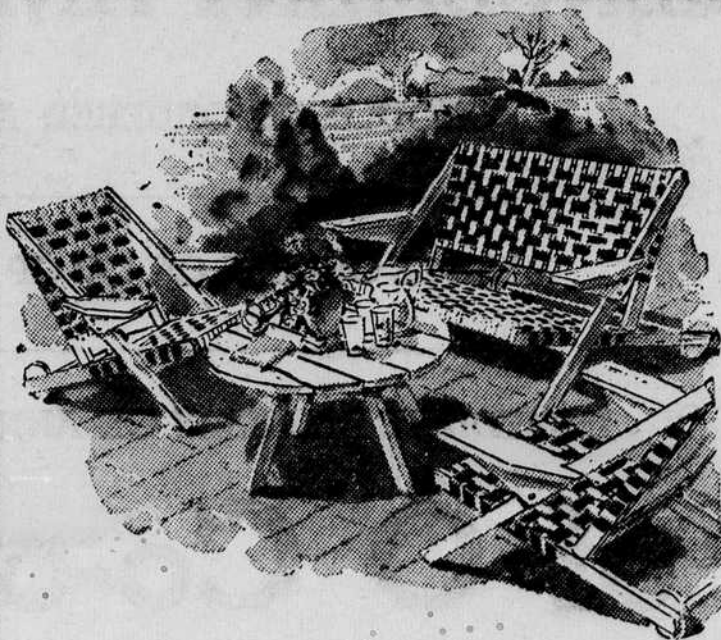
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
