

## Plea For Books From Far East

A plea for "old books, magazines, essays, clippings, flags, etc." has been received by the University from the General Moncado Academy of the Philippines. It is signed by Eustaquio Morala, director of the school which is a non-sectarian religious institution.

The letter tells of the burning of American flags, pictures of the presidents, 25,000 books, magazines and periodicals by the Japanese during the war. The school is attempting to rebuild its library of American things, according to Director Morala.

Two hundred of the students of this school went to war with the Americans against Japan, according to the report. Fifty were killed in action and many others wounded.

The appeal has been turned over to the Executive Council and the chairman of the World Student Service Fund.
