Junior weekend activities, together with activities strictly for mothers, will make up a full slate for Mother's weekend, May 6, 7, and 8.

Friday night, mothers will hear the all-campus sing and see the crowning of the Junior weekend Queen. Saturday's events will include a business meeting, luncheon, and tea, plus the float parade and junior prom in the evening.

Sunday the Oregon Mothers state board of directors will meet. Mother's day will be held at Eugene churches, and the Sunlight Serenade will take place. Dinners with sons and daughters at their living organizations will be arranged individually throughout the weekend.

Junior women who will make up the junior weekend court, which will reign at all weekend events, are Mary Margaret Jones and Phyllis Morgan, Eugene; Donna Masterson, Vale; Virginia Thompson, Monmouth; and Harriet Vannatta, Kohala, Hawaii. The queen has been selected from an earlier vote, but will not be revealed until the night of the All-campus sing.

Hospitality Chairman Betty Wright announced that the music and art schools, P. E. department, and the museums of oriental art and natural history will be open for mothers Saturday from 11 to 4.

Saturday night, Jimmy Zito's orchestra will play for the Junior prom at McArthur court. Theme for the dance is "A Night in Baghdad." A special section in the balcony will be reserved for mothers at the prom, and refreshments will be served there.

Wednesday has been set as the deadline for securing housing through Chairman Bev Buckley. Housing is still available, she said, asking that students desiring housing contact her or Mary Penwarden at the Tri-Delt house, 2900.

At intermission, the Gerlinger cup will be presented to the outstanding junior woman, and the Koyl cup to the outstanding junior man. Druids, junior men's honorary and Skull and Dagger, sophomore men's honorary will tap new members.

Sunday, May 8, all living organizations will hold special dinners for the mothers. That afternoon the Sunlight Serenade, featuring the winning organizations in the all-campus sing, will end the weekend.
