Krause Scatters Five Hits As Ducks Keep ND Lead; Kirschmen Hot in Seventh

SEATTLE, May 6—(AP)—Splurging for five runs in the seventh inning, the University of Oregon Ducks defeated the Washington Huskies, 6-1, in a Northern Division Coast Conference baseball game here yesterday.

Seven errors, six of them divided between shortstop and third base, plagued southpaw Bobby Moen of the Huskies.

He was rapped for five hits—three doubles, a triple and a single—which turned a 1-all pitching battle into a rout. Oregon's Mel Krause spaced five hits effectively.

The teams wind up their series tomorrow.

'O' Trackmen Slate Dual Meet at Idaho

Oregon's track and cinder men ran through their final workout yesterday before leaving for Seattle where they tackle Hec Edmundson's Washington Huskies.

Saturday's dual meet will be the 28th meeting of the two schools in a rivalry that started in 1920.

Of these 27 previous meets, the Huskies walked off with 21 contests while the Ducks have captured 6. The Webfoots have not beaten the Huskies since 1943, when they upset the Edmundson charges, 68-63.

In the individual events, the Ducks look like cinch victors in the pole vault, 100 and 220-yard dash, javelin, and broad jump.

The Huskies figure to grab the 880-yard run, the mile, two-mile, the discus, the high and low hurdles, and the high jump.

The 440-yard dash and the shotput are toss-up matches, where the Ducks hold a slight edge, but not by any outstanding margin.

Both teams have been hit by serious injuries during the last two weeks, which could figure in the final outcome. Bowerman is leaving Bob Weber, number two broad jumper, and Pete Murer, hurdler, in Eugene. Weber pulled a leg muscle during Wednesday's time trials, while Murer won't compete any more this year because of a leg injury received in football.

EDMUNDSON'S chief worry for the last week has been the injured leg of star half-miler Jack Hensey, who was in the UW infirmary for observation most of the week. Hensey was forced to withdraw from the Idaho meet and has been undergoing treatment ever since.

Three Reasons Why Hogan Isn't Golfing

DALLAS, May 6 — (AP) — Ben Hogan, golf's little giant, said yesterday there were three major obstacles in the way of his return to the game as a competitor.

They are: a fractured ankle, a cracked collar bone and a case of nerves. He isn't sure which is the biggest obstacle but said he was mighty hopeful he could lick all three.

The 1948 National open and National PGA champion is attending his first golf meet since a bus-auto crash three months ago almost took his life. He is a spectator at the Texas PGA in which his golf buddy of years standing, Byron Nelson, is defending champion.
