

Veterans Urged To Stop Leave

All veterans who wish to conserve eligibility time under the GI Bill of Rights must cancel their leave time for the end of this term by May 15, J. D. Kline, assistant registrar, announced yesterday.

Any veteran who fails to do this will automatically be given 15 days' leave after the end of the term, resulting in further loss of eligibility time.

"All veterans who contemplate using their full GI benefits for education should make every effort to cancel this leave time at the end of each term," Kline stated. Kline urges all veterans to contact him about conserving eligibility, stating that this would be to the advantage of every veteran.

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Correspondence Courses Open for UO Students

a three-hour course, and from 22 to 24 assignments in a four-hour course. Each assignment equals two classroom lessons.

After each assignment is mastered, the student works out a set of questions and problems which he sends in for correction. These are mailed back with suggestions from the instructor. The final examination is taken under supervision.

Catalogs may be obtained from the general extension division, State System of Higher Education.

More than 200 college courses are available through correspondence study for those student who cannot attend summer school, advises Mozelle Hair, head of correspondence study for the general

extension division of the State System of Higher Education.

Besides upper division work for students who need only a few hours to graduate and for teachers, about 50 high school courses are available.

"One can earn approximately the same credit by correspondence as in residence," states Miss Hair. "In many cases the same texts are used, and the same professor reads the papers."

All credit is recorded in the correspondence department and may be transferred to any school of the state system.

Students are advised to carry no more than two courses at one time. There are about 16 assignments in
