

# Huskies Upset Webfoots, 12-5

## Arnason Registers 8-Hit Win

Too much Hal Arnason and similar top heaviness in the hitting column on the part of Art McLarney's hustling Washington Huskies joined forces yesterday to deal Oregon a 12-5 setback.

The defeat, completing the Ducks' six game road trip, dropped Don Kirsch and his lads into a first place tie with Washington State.

VICTOR in four out of five starts on the Northern swing, Oregon now boasts eight wins and three defeats, as does Buck Bailey's nine.

Arnason limited the Lemon-and-Green to eight safeties, and backed by the solid smashing of his mates, who drove out a dozen hits and two opposing pitchers from the mound, he coasted in easily.

Oregon used three hurlers all told, starting with Sid Mills.

HE WAS shelled to the showers after yielding the Huskies a 4-1 lead.

Big Stick for Victors was Bill Andring, who, with three hits, boosted his loop-leading batting average. Johnny Kovenz of the Ducks also came through with a trio of bingles.

Next game for the Kirschmen is Wednesday when they take on Willamette at Salem.

220-yard dash: Same as Century. Oregon 8, Washington 1.

440-yard dash: 1—Harrison (W); 2—Countryman (O); 3—Sullivan (O). Nod goes to Donn Harrison because of his Idaho performance last Saturday. Oregon 4, Washington 5.

## 'O' Netters in Win

Oregon's hard-stroking tennis team encountered little trouble in downing Idaho 5-2 yesterday as they tuned up for today's match with Washington State in Pullman.

The present road trip, which concludes against the Cougars, represents the last ND competition of the season for the Duck netters with the exception of a meet with Oregon State followed by the Northern Division championships.

The final event this afternoon, the mile relay, could well be the decisive one when Coach Bill Bowerman's Webfoot cindermen take on the Washington Huskies in Seattle.

Both teams will have to depend heavily on their depth material to gain the dual meet victory since each outfit completely dominates particular events. These crucial events where the average run-of-the-mill athletes hold the balance of power are the 440-yard run, second and third place in the hurdles, and the shot put.

Using a graduated Williamson rating system and a mystic's crystal ball, we predict the invading Ducks will capture the relay and the meet by a score of 69-62.
